Alsike Group Holds Meeting

At a meeting of Klamath Basin alsike seed growers at the Henley Grange Hall Thursday night a resolution was passed to present a petition to the farm bureau centers for approval to organize a corporation to contract with the Cal-Approved Seed Growers Association for the marketing of alsike seed.

Principal speaker for the evening was Louis A. Rozzoni, Berkeley, vice president of the California State Farm Bureau, who was instrumental in organizing Cal-Approved in 1948 through the assistance of the Farm Bureau.

As Cal-Approved exists as a California organization and organized under the laws of California, Rozzoni stated he was doubtful if individual Oregon growers could be accepted to membership in the corporation. However, he asserted he could see no reason why the Oregon growers could not form their own cooperative and contract their alsike seed with Cal-Approved for marketing.

Red Cross Name Canteen Workers
