Susan Vandenberg, organist, accompanied soloist, Mrs. Robert Long, Bobby and Jerry Andersch, brothers of the bridegroom, were candlelighters.

The bride's gown of lace and net over white slipper satin, was made with a floor length skirt of yards and yards of gathered net over the satin with a wide gathered band of Chantilly lace below the hips. The bodice was of lace and net, designed with a high round neck, and deep sweetheart neckline of lace and long fitted sleeves of lace pointed at the wrists.

The fingertip veil of illusion was held by a close-fitting cap trimmed with seed pearls. The wide band of lace edging on the veil perfectly matched the lace on the gown. Barbara carried an arrangement of white roses and lilies-of-the-valley centered with white rosebuds — tied with wide satin streamers.
