Sunken Gold Hunt Planned

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Did the S. S. Yukon go down in the Gulf of Alaska eight years ago with 250 pounds of gold worth \$90,000 as part of its cargo?
 An Anchorage man, Jim M. Sumpster, thinks so and plans to dive to the sunken hulk 200 feet below the surface in search of the treasure. He told the Anchorage Times Saturday he and others already have started the salvage operation.
 But in Seattle, a spokesman for the Alaska Steamship Co. disputed Sumpster's report that the Yukon carried the gold bullion as a shipment from a Fairbanks bank to Seattle.
 The company official, Sid Hayman, said the gold never appeared on the Yukon's manifest and no claim for compensation ever had been made.
 The Yukon sank Feb. 3, 1946 with the loss of 12 lives.

Young Wins Control Of NY Central

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Financier Robert R. Young was officially certified Monday as the winner of the bitter war for control of the New York Central Railroad.
 The election inspectors announced that the 15-member slate of directors put up by the Young forces had won by a margin of 1,067,188 over the Central management's present board, headed by President William White.
 The Young group received a total of 3,406,987 as against 2,339,799 for the management candidates.
 White, who presided at the convened session of the annual meeting of the stockholders, announced that "I will not remain as president of New York Central. I will nevertheless cooperate with the new group in effecting an orderly transition."
 White, who received a salary of \$120,000 a year, was asked by a reporter whether he intended to resign. He replied, "Do you think that is necessary?"
 He obviously was referring to a prior announcement by Young that the new slate of 14 men and one woman would meet in New York City late Monday afternoon and elect a new president.
 Young's choice is expected to be Alfred E. Periman, executive vice president of the Denver and Rio Grand Western Railroad.

Heat Wave Scores East

 Early morning temperatures in the 70s and 80s presaged another scorcher for much of the eastern half of the nation Monday, after record 95s for June 13 were set in Baltimore and Chicago.
 Muggy heat lay like a blanket eastward from the Great Plains, with some moderation in the northern and eastern Great Lakes and northern New England portions.
 Thunderstorms were common in some areas. This form of relief from the heat carried with it damaging high winds, hail and flash floods Sunday.
 Trees were uprooted, power lines downed and crops damaged by hail and wind in upstate New York. The village of Sidney Center got three inches of rain in a little over two hours, and its second flash flood in four days. Three deaths were attributed to the violent weather.
 A twister uprooted a grandstand at Trenton, Neb. but no one in a crowd of 1,000 watching stock car races was reported injured.
 Three persons were injured Sunday by a torrential rainstorm that broke 95-degree heat at Ironton, Ohio.

New York Holds Air Raid Drill

NEW YORK (AP) — New York's teeming millions stood still for 10 minutes Monday in the city's second full-scale air raid drill since World War II.
 The test apparently went off without a hitch.
 The sirens wailed at 10 a. m. (EDT) and movement ceased across the face of the city.
 Pedestrians hustled to shelter, surface transportation halted, discharging passengers and the streets lost all semblance of their normal mid-morning tumult.
 The continuing exercise assumes 2,175,000 persons died and 800,000 were injured in the fury unleashed by the A-weapons.

Baltic Countries Freedom Sought

NEW YORK (AP) — President Eisenhower said Sunday the United States will continue its efforts to help Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania regain independence.
 The statement was made in a telegram to the Baltic States Freedom Committee, which was read to about 750 persons attending a meeting marking the 14th anniversary of the march of Soviet troops into the three small Baltic nations which are now a part of the Soviet Union.
