ASHLAND — The 14th annual season of the famed Oregon Shakespearean festival gets underway in earnest here today, when auditions for roles in the coming season begin in the open-air theatre in Lithia park.

Over 100 aspiring young actors from all parts of the United States began arriving in Ashland last week, intent on winning roles in several of all the 4 plays to be performed this summer.

Scheduled for production are "Hamlet," "The Merry Wives of Windsor," "The Winter's Tale" and "Henry VI, part 2." In addition, many will appear in the concerts of Elizabethan music, two of which are to be staged again this year, during the month-long season beginning August 1.

Among the large festival company, which mixes professional actors and drama students from the nation's leading universities are 14 who received much sought-after scholarships, which pay room and board for, a full summer's work. The remainder of the company will be working for love — or for the advantage of having appeared in America's oldest Shakespearean festival.
