

Hollywood Minus Carlos Bernier

Having just blown five of seven games to Oakland, the San Francisco Seals invade Hollywood Tuesday night for seven games with the Pacific Coast League leading Stars. On paper, it would seem that San Francisco would be doing very well to win two against Hollywood, but baseball has its daily surprises.

One of the top Hollywood players won't be in the lineup. Carlos Bernier, the speedy outfielder and base stealer, is on the bench indefinitely by order of PCL president Clarence Rowland. Bernier was fined \$50 Monday and suspended indefinitely for insulting some fans, who were booing him at Wrigley Field, and kicking Bud Hardin, Los Angeles shortstop.

President Rowland said Bernier's actions could have caused a riot. Virtually the entire Hollywood and Los Angeles team milled around after the fight started when Bernier was thrown out trying to steal second base Sunday.

Seattle, after a rough week in Portland during which the Rainiers lost five of six games to the cellar-dwelling Beavers, will try to find the winning formula at San Diego starting Tuesday night. And Portland will try to keep its win streak going at the expense of Sacramento.

Seattle manager Gerry Priddy named Bill Evans, who has won five and lost one for the Rainiers, to start against Bob Kerrigan, who has a seven and six record.

Clay Hopper said either Red Adams (1-6) or Jess Flores (1-4) would start against Marino Pietrelli (9-3) at Sacramento.

Spokane Headed For Final Games

The Spokane Indians headed into Canada Tuesday for what could be their last games in the Western International League while the fans at home studied ways and means of keeping the club in baseball's largest circuit.

The schedule sends the Indians to Edmonton and Calgary during the week of grace allowed by league directors Sunday. The directors, meeting to study plans to keep the financially harassed franchise afloat, declared the Spokane franchise forfeited. However, they agreed to operate the club for a week while local fans worked on a program under which ownership would be transferred from Roy Hotchkiss.

The directors said if the community ownership plan fails, the league will be cut to nine teams. Hotchkiss, blaming the poor attendance that has plagued all teams of the loop and his own poor health, refused to continue operation of the club after Sunday. He set \$225,000 as the price for his holdings, but said he thought a lease could be worked out.

One hurdle was cleared Monday when the president of a rival club put up \$7,000 for back pay owed the Spokane players. Orin E. (Babe) Hollingsberry, former Washington State College football coach who now is president of the Yakima Bears, gave a personal check to pay the players.

The Indians are scheduled to play three games at Edmonton, starting Tuesday night, and four at Calgary, before the deadline set by the league.

All clubs were idle Monday night. Rain washed out a scheduled Vancouver-Victoria game and an exhibition contest between Salem and Seattle of the Pacific Coast League.

Victoria will play a doubleheader at Vancouver Tuesday night. Lewiston will be at Calgary. Tri-City at Wenatchee and Salem at Yakima.

George Price Returning To Fight Ring

Scribe Meets With Exclusive Ring Club

GROSSINGER, N.Y. (AP)—By a happy coincidence of timing, it was possible to hold here at Rocky Marciano's training camp the first annual meeting of one of the most exclusive little boxing clubs in the country.

The membership is confined to those fearless experts who poked Roland LaStarza to defeat Rocky in their championship duel here last fall. Four of them chanced to be visiting the Marciano manège at the same hour, and no time was lost in calling the doughty, if nameless, group together.

All four, as it turned out, still had the same jobs they held nearly a year ago when they predicted that LaStarza, the boxer, would outsmart the crude puncher, Marciano, for 15 rounds and win the decision. None of them had even been threatened.

"I still think it was a good pick," insisted the largest member of the group, stubbornly. "I had LaStarza well ahead on points until Rocky caught him in the 11th. I thought he was outboxing Rocky good."

"That's right, agreed a lodge

brother. "I never apologized to anybody. The only place we went wrong on Roland was not realizing he had gone stale. He came in three or four pounds less than anybody expected him to. Didn't you think he looked stale?"

"Yeah, I thought so," put in a new voice. "but only after Rocky started hitting him in the belly toward the end. Those punches made him plenty stale. This guy hits awfully hard. He keeps on hitting hard for a long time too."

There ensued a considerable discussion of LaStarza's merits as compared with those of Ezzard Charles, who is to sample the Marciano torpedoes on Thursday night at Yankee Stadium. The membership agreed without a dissenting vote that Charles is a far fiercer challenger than Roland was.

"This guy's been around," pointed out the delegate from Chicago.

"He can box and he can punch. Compared with him, LaStarza was just a good amateur. Roland can't be much when he loses to that fat British fellow, Don Cockell."

"Any of you fellows going to pick against the champ this time?" asked one of the group.

Boudreau Seeking First Division With Ballclub Loaded With Youth

BOSTON (AP)—The Boston Red Sox are prepared to swim or sink with their youngsters in the American League race this year and the recent sale of George Kell proves it.

The hard-luck Sox got off to a poor start, spending most of the first six weeks of the campaign in last place, after glowing preseason predictions for them.

One big reason for the bad beginning was a rash of injuries. Slugger Ted Williams broke a shoulder bone on the first day of spring training (March 1) and didn't get into the lineup until May 15. Left-hander Mel Parnell, ace of the pitching staff, broke a bone in his throwing arm April 24 in Washington.

And Kell, a fine ball player at his best, started the year with the same troublesome back ailment that plagued him the past few seasons. His throws from third base weren't as sure as they once were. So when Chicago offered a reported \$100,000 and utility infielder Grady Hatton for him the Boston management grabbed it.

The White Sox needed a spot player — a role Kell still can fill capably. The Red Sox officials would have preferred a major player deal but when nothing materialized they went for cash.

Weather also played against Boston as the club was rained out of 11 of its first 20 home games. It was enough to take the edge off the pitchers and cause the batters to lose their eye.

Through it all Manager Lou Boudreau hasn't backpedaled from a spring estimate that Boston is a first division club. After Kell's sale was announced Boudreau insisted:

"We will still finish no worse than the first division. We still have a chance for the pennant."

Boston has a fine crop of coming stars on its roster but they need experience. After the first time around the league rookie Harry Agganis had won the first base assignment and is a 300 hitter with long range power. Milt Bolling, Ted Lepcio and Billy Consolo are jockeying for infield positions. And the quartet of Truman, Clevenger, Tom

meets features 35 all stars from each conference and will be run off in an hour and a half, at Northwestern University's Dyche Stadium.

PCC teams have won eight of 12 previous meets, including the last three. The Western athletes are favored heavily again, mostly on the basis of comparative performances in Saturday's NCAA meet at Ann Arbor, Mich.

Southern California, which has 14 men on the PCC squad, ran away with the NCAA meet—scoring more than twice as many points as the runner-up squad, Illinois of the Big Ten.

Illinois had three individual winners to Southern Cal's two, but the Trojans piled up points with a variety of seconds, thirds and other placings.

The USC contingent is headed by high jumper Ernie Shelton and 440-yard man Jim Lea, both NCAA winners. Shelton narrowly missed a 7-foot effort at Ann Arbor and Lea ran the 440 in 46.7 seconds for his second consecutive NCAA crown.

Other coast NCAA winners expected to repeat are miler Bill Dellinger of Oregon and polevaulter Larry Anderson of California.

In addition, the PCC is expected to get a clinch one-two placing in the discus from Southern Cal's Des Koch and Les Patterson.

Players like Williams, Parnell, bullpen artist Ellis Kinder and a hard-hitting handyman Billy Goodman lend stability to the combination.

Batting slumps hit centerfielder Jackie Jensen and catcher Samy White early but Boudreau expresses confidence in both.

"The mistakes these kids are making now are the ones they should have made last year when they went so good," Boudreau says. "Nevertheless, I'm going along with our youth movement and I know the fans will agree with me."

At first glance the Kell deal looked like a departure from Red Sox policy. It was the first sale of a star in Tom Yawkey's 22 years as club owner.

"We'd have been foolish not to make the deal, it was such a big offer," was General Manager Joe Cronin's comment. "There's the
