Firemen Hold Fire Survey

In an attempt to limit fires in the city, local fire department members have begun a house to house survey of fire hazards.

Firemen inspect a house, point out fire hazards to the housewife but make no requirement that the hazards be removed; they merely inform occupants of the dangers present.

Of the 103 houses inspected to date, 79 fire hazards have been found, according to Fire Chief Roy Rowe.

Leading the list of hazards are stove pipes not properly installed—21 to be exact. Next in line are unsafe wiring, 16, and extension cord wiring excessive or defective, 14.

Also high in number are defective fuses or fuse boxes, 13, and over-used fuse boxes, 11.

Plans are to continue the inspections over a period of months until all homes in the city have been contacted. Chief Rowe said that firemen were refused admittance in only one house so far.

Oregon Solons Support Ike

WASHINGTON—The Oregon Delegation to the House of Representatives leads all delegations in the country in its record of support for President Eisenhower's program, and in its perfect attendance and voting record on all major legislation so far at this session, Congressman Sam Coon stated this week.

The showing by the four Oregon representatives was made public in a survey published in the current issue of Congressional Quarterly magazine. The survey did not include the four small states having only one representative in Congress.
