### Young KF Men Join Marines

The recruiting sergeants of the local Marine Corps Recruiting Station have announced acceptance of two more Klamath Falls applicants. They are Mr. and Mrs. Gerald W. Bevans, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald W. Bevans, 929 Alameda, and Donald E. Wells, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles K. Wells, 341 Hillside Ave. The two new Marines, who are recent high school graduates, participated actively in sports while attending Klamath Union High School. Both men applied for the Marines' two year enlistment program, which terminates at the end of this month. They will leave Klamath Falls on June 20, at which time they will receive their examinations and further transfer to the Marine Corps Recruit Depot, San Diego, for 10 weeks of boot camp. After completion of recruit training, they will receive at least 10 days leave prior to reporting for further training in their respective jobs, of which the Marine Corps offers over 400. Any man wishing to do so, may train with these men, but must apply soon in order to complete processing before June 19. The recruiting office is in the Klamath County Courthouse basement.

### Amateur Radio Meet Planned

Commander R. E. "Bob" Thomlinson, USNR, assistant to the director of Naval Reserve, headquarters 13th Naval District, Seattle, will address the Sunday dinner meeting of the Oregon Amateur Radio Association during its 17th Convention held this year in Klamath Falls, 26-27 June 1954. His topic "Science of Tomorrow." Commander Thomlinson was a staff member of Radio Station KGW, The Oregonian, for 21 years. And for the six years prior to being recalled to active duty in April 1951, he was KGW's director of special events.

The commander entered the Navy as a lieutenant (Junior Grade) in December 1941. During World War II he served in command of cable and radio censorship, Southeastern Alaska with headquarters at Juneau; senior watch officer for the District Censorship Office, Seattle; communications watch officer on the staff of commander, Escort Carrier Division 26, aboard the USS Bay, one of the Kaiser carriers (USS Bay, one of the Kaiser carriers) in the Pacific, in December 1941. He also served as staff communication officer for Carrier Division 23 taking part in the Saipan-Guam-Palau-Samar-Leyte-Luzon and Okinawa campaigns. He was released to inactive duty in November 1945.

In the Volunteer Naval Reserve at Swan Island, Commander Thomlinson was commanding officer of Volunteer Public Relations Unit 13-2 at the time he was recalled to active duty as assistant public information officer for Com13 in April 1951. Commander Thomlinson has been a licensed radio amateur with the call WTLY for over 30 years.

"The law says that you can't use alcoholic beverages until you are 21 years old," the judge said. "It is your duty as good citizens to obey the law. Other boys in this community are now under investigation for more serious offenses. I hope this will be a lesson to you. Make sure you don't get into trouble again." The students were arrested in possession of a case and a half of beer by state police. Police said they were drinking the beer in a parked automobile.
