



Jury Finds Terrorists Guilty

WASHINGTON (AP)—Mrs. Lolita Lebron waited alone as the sole subject of jury deliberations today on the fanatical shooting in the House of Representatives March 1.

A federal jury of seven men and five women, behind closed doors for 9½ hours, emerged late last night with verdicts of guilty on all 10 counts of assault lodged against her three male associates: Rafael Cancel Miranda, 25, Andres Figueroa Cordero, 29, and Irving Flores Rodriguez, 28.

The 34-year-old Mrs. Lebron, already convicted along with the three men on five counts of assault with a dangerous weapon, whispered when she heard the verdict:

"I don't see why they don't convict me too."

With five charges of assault with intent to kill still outstanding against the woman defendant, U.S. Dist. Judge Alexander Holtzoff sent the jury home for the night and told them to return today to pass final judgment.

Mrs. Lebron's fellow Puerto Ricans gave no show of emotion upon hearing the verdict, which carries a maximum penalty of 75 years in prison. But soon afterwards Cancel and Cordero chatted and smiled, and Flores, although not smiling, joined briefly in the conversation.

All four admit to opening up with wild pistol fire from the House gallery. Five congressmen were wounded. But the Puerto Rican Nationalists say they meant to kill or harm no one, their only aim being to dramatize their demand for Puerto Rican independence.

Under the law, each defendant could possibly receive a sentence of up to 10 years apiece on each of the weapons counts and 15 years apiece on each of the intent-to-kill counts, or a maximum of 125 years. The judge has discretion as to whether the sentences should run concurrently, however, and Judge Holtzoff has announced he will not impose a total of more than the 75 years allowable under the intent-to-kill finding.

Senate Gets Defense Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—The biggest money bill of the year came up for possible Senate passage today amid Democratic cries that the Eisenhower defense budget is taking a "terrible gamble" with the nation's security.

At least one Democrat-sponsored move and perhaps more were afoot to tack more millions on the \$20,217,106,486 annual military funds bill that went through a round of Senate debate yesterday. The measure carries appropriations for the Army, Navy, Air Force and related activities for the year beginning July 1.

Sen. Symington (D-Mo.), a former secretary of the Air Force, told newsmen in advance of today's session that he would seek another 100 to 250 million dollars for research and development of guided missiles, rockets and other new weapons.

And Sen. Kennedy (D-Mass.), leader of a Democratic group which unsuccessfully tried to add \$50 million for continuation of two Army divisions which would be eliminated under the present budget, said he was looking for a means to offer the amendment again today.

Otherwise Senate consideration was highlighted by a contention from Sen. Gore (D-Tenn.) that the pared-down defense budget was a "terrible gamble" with security of this nation and the free world, and by similar protests from Democratic Senators Montmercy (Okla.), Humphrey (Minn.), Mansfield (Mont.) and Maybank (S.C.).

Stevenson To Visit West

WASHINGTON (AP)—Adlai Stevenson plans a series of political speeches in the Pacific Northwest and Alaska next month.

The Democratic National Committee announced Wednesday the party's 1952 presidential candidate will go to Portland the first week of July to visit friends.

The schedule will send Stevenson to Eugene, Ore. July 10 to speak on behalf of Richard Neuberger, Democratic nominee for the seat held by Sen. Gordon (R-Ore.) and other Democratic candidates.

The national committee said Stevenson will also speak either in Spokane or Seattle on a date to be set by Washington State Democratic leaders. He will sail for Alaska July 14 and will make a major speech at Anchorage July 24.

Theater Plans Translator

PARIS (AP)—A Paris theater is experimenting with a U.N.-type translation apparatus as a lure to English-speaking visitors who don't know French.

The gadget is a tiny earphone similar to the simultaneous translation system used by delegates and visitors at U.N. meetings. Unlike the U.N. sets, however, the receiver is held to the ear (no headset) to muffle madame's coiffure, and only one language—English—is offered.

The translation comes from a recording whose speed is regulated as the play progresses. Experimentally, 20 of the sets have been installed in the 800-seat Comedie des Champs Elysees, now playing a revival of Marcel Aymé's popular comedy "Clerambard."

Bilingual theatergoers say the translation is good, and funny, but the volume can't be regulated and the record doesn't always keep pace with the action.

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
