Not Guilty Pleas Filed

Three persons indicted on felony charges by the Klamath County Grand Jury filed pleas of not guilty Thursday when arraigned before Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

The pleas were entered after Judge Vandenberg overruled demurrers to the three indictments by Defense Attorney George Proctor.

The defendants are: Dewey Rex Morelock, charged with non-support of a minor child; Robert R. Smith, accused of obtaining money under false pretenses; and Clyde D. Durkee, charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

State Grange Against Tax

ALBANY, Ore. (U.S.A.)—The Oregon Grange unanimously voted today a sales tax proposal Wednesday, reaffirming its traditional stand against such a tax.

This one came from the Willowa Grange, proposing that the sales tax be used to finance public schools. Elmer McClure, state Grange master, spoke against it, and afterwards congratulated delegates to the annual convention for voting against such a tax, even when tied to school support.

Also speaking against the proposal was George Sehmeyer, master of the California Grange. "I'd like to donate the sales tax, use tax and daylight savings time to Oregon. They're causing nothing but grief in my state," said Sehmeyer.

Delegates passed a resolution protesting recent parcel post rate increases. The resolution asked Congress to take over the fixing of rates.

Alfred C. Ullman, Baker County granger who also is the Democratic nominee for second district congressman and president of the National Hells Canyon Assn., urged continued efforts to "keep the Snake River development program in public hands."

In balloting for state lecturer no candidate received a majority vote. A runoff election was scheduled for the top three candidates—Willie McLean of Jackson County, Delta Johnson of Sherman and Mary Arne of Lane.

Judge Suspends Plumbing Fines

Two amateur plumbers who pleaded guilty to violating the state health code were given suspended fines of \$10 each Thursday by District Judge D. E. Van Vactor.

The defendants were Edward H. Reeves, 47, and Charles M. Corneil, 26. They were accused by D. J. Arnold, Grants Pass, deputy state plumbing inspector, with installing plumbing without certification of competency.

They were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Dal Reed on warrants issued by the district attorney's office. Reed said they were installing plumbing in a residence belonging to Mrs. Norma G. Miller.

Arms Embargo Backed By U.S.

WASHINGTON (U.S.A.)—The State Department said Thursday that through the cooperation of "friendly countries" the United States has succeeded in preventing the shipment of new cargoes of arms to Red-influenced Guatemala.

At the same time a Department spokesman disclosed that this country is trying through consultation with major shipping nations to set up an embargo against any sale or delivery of arms. The Guatemalans have been urgently trying to obtain such items, according to information here.

Press Officer Lincoln White refused to confirm or deny information from other highly authoritative sources that the American government has asked shipping nations to agree under certain conditions to make their vessels subject to search and seizure, by American warships, of any arms cargoes for Guatemala.

Robbery Suspect Apprehended

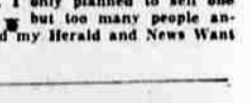

Churchmen Hit Investigations

REDLANDS, Calif. (U.S.A.)—The Southern California-Arizona Methodist Conference, representing 180,000 Methodists, charges that congressional investigating committees "have exceeded the legitimate bounds of their fields of investigation and have made serious inroads on the freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution."

A resolution, adopted Wednesday, specifically named the committees of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) and Rep. Velde (R-Ill.) as having "usurped and abused power."
