Churchill Speeches Considered

WASHINGTON (AP)—British Prime Minister Churchill may appeal to the American public for closer U.S. British teamwork, possibly in an address before Congress, during his visit in Washington for talks with President Eisenhower.

U.S. officials raised the possibility of a congressional address today, and also the alternative that Churchill might choose to make a major speech before an unofficial body such as a press group.

Diplomatic sources noted Churchill has spoken before Congress several times in the past in the course of eight visits to the United States since the beginning of World War II. However, they said no invitation for a congressional appearance has been issued for the visit, which begins a week from tomorrow.

The other possibility was suggested by Eisenhower himself at his news conference yesterday. He said a British friend had reminded him that on visits to Washington Churchill was always a luncheon guest at the National Press Club. Distinguished visitors often speak there.

Plans for the visit, announced Tuesday, are still in process of development. Churchill, British Foreign Secretary Eden and staff aides are due to fly from London next Thursday afternoon and arrive in Washington sometime Friday.

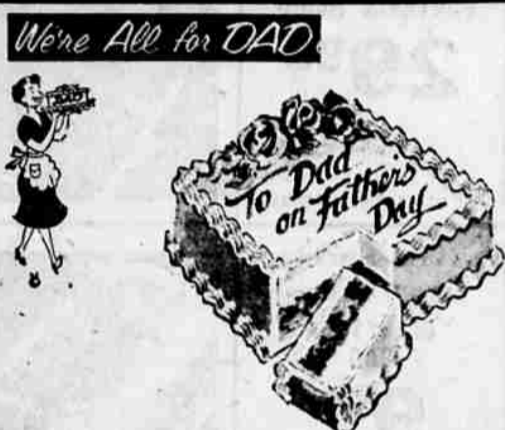
The talks between the chiefs of state will begin Friday afternoon or at latest Friday evening, informants said, and will go on at least through June 26 and 27. Churchill and Eden are expected to remain as White House guests through Sunday. If there is then reason for their remaining in Washington one or two days more they may move to the British Embassy.

Diplomatic informants continued to insist that there will be no fixed program of subjects for discussion. They said Churchill's interest in coming here primarily is to have a series of private conversations with Eisenhower. If there is any formal conferring on world problems to be done, one informant suggested that it probably will be handled by Eden and Secretary of State Dulles and their top advisers.

Eisenhower told his news conference his main aim at the informal meeting with Churchill would be to strengthen America's bridge of friendship with Britain. There is no fixed agenda, he said, but the talks will deal with virtually every urgent world problem, including Southeast Asia.

Authorities discount strongly any speculation that the 79-year-old British leader will urge Eisenhower to agree to arrange a conference with Soviet Premier Malenkov.

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'55 Grange To Meet In Klamath

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—Delegates attending the annual meeting of the Oregon Grange voted Tuesday to hold next year's convention at Klamath Falls.

The executive committee will set the date later.

In other action Tuesday the Grange reported a drop in memberships; nominated five persons for the position of state lecturer;

took action on a number of resolutions; and heard several speakers. Secretary Mildred Norman reported that membership on April 30 was 28,434—a decrease of 1,007 from last year. Plans were announced for a membership drive.

Nominees for state lecturer are Mary Narne of Lane County; Willie McLean of Jackson; Helen Morgan of Multnomah; Blanche

Pickering of Clatsop; and Delta Johnson of Sherman. Results of balloting were to be announced Wednesday.

Speakers at Tuesday sessions were Gov. Paul Patterson; J. D. McDonald, president of the State Federation of Labor; and Harley Libby, president of the Oregon Farmers Union.

Endorsement of State Master Elmer McClure's denunciation of the methods and activities of Sen. Joseph McCarthy (R-Wis.).
Opposed daylight-saving time.
Opposed action by the State Game Commission in seeking to

maintain 200 second feet of water in the Deschutes River.
Opposed salary increases for congressmen and federal judges.
Opposed changes in state truck laws to give farm trucks special privileges.
