

Overtime Games Mark PCL Action

Seattle and Portland forced their Pacific Coast League baseball foes into overtime Thursday night.

Nippy Jones, Sacramento's first baseman, batted in the winning run as the Solons beat Portland, 4-3, in 10 innings, and at San Diego Tommy Byrne was the Padres in the extra frame, 5-4. Bill Wright was the loser. It was Wright's first loss of the year and it snapped a San Diego winning streak that had extended to six games. Manager Jerry Priddy's single with two out drove in the winning run for the Rainiers. And that snapped Seattle's losing streak at six games.

Milo Candini was the winning pitcher at Sacramento as he came to the rescue of Bud Daley in the ninth inning against the Ports. Bob Alexander started for Portland, was relieved in the sixth by Jess Flores, and Lee Anthony took over in the ninth.

Oakland put on a seventh inning rally good for three runs and a 5-3 victory over Los Angeles which had won the first two games of the series. Don Ferrarese, south paw, held the Angels to seven hits.

The San Francisco Seals and the Hollywood Stars played one of those old-fashioned pitchers' battle ball games.

Hollywood won the game, 1-0, on a fifth inning home run by big Jack Phillips, third baseman.

The winning pitcher was Roger Bowman, who gave the Seals only three hits and fanned eight as he registered his eighth consecutive victory.

Emer Singleton, who opposed Bowman, allowed only four hits in the seven innings he worked.

Spokane Back Into Flag Race

While the Spokane fans tangle with the problem of providing a home for their orphaned Indians, the club is making a determined effort to get back into the Western International Baseball League pennant chase.

The Indians, midway of what could be their last WIL road trip, nung up their fourth straight win Thursday night in downing Edmonton 7-2 and 4-1. That hoisted them into third place, 5 1/2 games behind pace-setting Vancouver.

The Spokane club, left without a home when league officials declared the franchise forfeited last Sunday, is playing this week under direction of the league while a civic committee works on a community ownership plan.

The committee has until Monday to develop a program to take over the franchise and equipment from former owner Roy Hotchkiss.

Spokane Mayor Arthur Meehan, head of "Save the Spokane Indians, Inc.," said Thursday after a conference with Hotchkiss the committee must raise \$39,866.41 by Monday to keep the team in the league. Meehan said the committee was confident it could get the money but the "question is can we get it in time."

Poor attendance was one of the reasons for Spokane's plight. That plague hit Vancouver Thursday night. Only 104 fans, the smallest crowd in the history of the stadium, turned out on a drizzly night to watch the Capilanos upset Victoria 8-2. The win stretched Vancouver's margin over runner-up Yakima to five full games.

Yakima split a doubleheader with Salem, winning the nightcap 2-0 after the Senators took the opener 7-1; Calgary thumped Lewiston 11-2 and Wenatchee shaded Tri-City 7-6.

At Yakima, Salem scored three runs in the first inning of the opener and never was headed. Danny Rios turned in a three-hitter for Yakima in winning the afterpiece.

Home runs by Charlie Lundgren and Gene Lillard crushed Lewiston at Calgary. Lundgren's two-run homer in the third snapped a 2-2 deadlock. Lillard added a grand slammer in the sixth.

Ted Shandor held Tri-City scoreless for six innings at Wenatchee while his mates piled up a 6-0 lead. Three Wenatchee errors and two singles and a double let in five Tri-City runs in the seventh. Tri-City scored once more in the eighth, after Tommy Munoz' homer had given Wenatchee an insurance run in the seventh, but Shandor managed to end the rally.

TACOMA (AP) — The defending champion and the medalist led the field of 16 into the second round of match play in the 33rd Washington State Amateur Golf Tournament Friday.

Dick Price of Longview, seeking his second title in the battle of the simon-pures, was paired against Dick Baker of Tacoma. Unheralded Pat Johnson of Tacoma, who won the medal Wednesday with a brilliant 2-under-par 69, met another Tacoman, John Padur.

Five other Tacoma golfers and seven from Seattle got through Thursday's round. Those who survive Friday will meet in the quarterfinals and semifinals Saturday. Winners Saturday will meet in a 36-hole championship round Sunday.

All three American League leaders won yesterday. Cleveland ran its winning streak to eight games with a 6-4 triumph over Washington. The White Sox outlasted Philadelphia 6-4 and New York breezed over Baltimore 9-2. Boston lost its ninth game in its last 10 starts, 2-1 to Detroit.

In the National League, the New York Giants pulled two games in front of the Brooklyn Dodgers by shading Cincinnati 2-1. Brooklyn lost to Milwaukee 6-4. Philadelphia and St. Louis played the longest game of the season—15 innings—before the Phils won 3-2 with Robin Roberts going all the way. Chicago was rained out at Pittsburgh.

Cleveland jumped away to a three-run lead in the first inning against the Senators as Frank Shea walked two men and hit one. Vic Wertz doubled and Wally Westlake singled. The Washington runs came in the seventh when Early Wynn walked the bases loaded and in the ninth on Mickey Vernon's two-run homer.

Baltimore's defense fell apart as the Orioles lost their third straight to the Yankees. New York wrapped it up with five runs in the sixth.

The Philadelphia right-hander didn't walk a man in the 15 innings. He struck out seven and gave up 10 hits. Bobby Morgan forced the game into overtime with a home run off Gerry Staley with two out in the ninth. Joe Preko took over at the start of the 13th and was the loser.

The Cardinals scored their first run on a homer by Bill Barni and their second on singles by Red Schoendienst and Stan Musial plus a sacrifice fly by Ray Jablonski.
