Spud Digging Tests Shown

Improvement in potato harvesting equipment can save farmers money by less damage to potatoes, according to marketing investigators of the Alabama, Florida, North Carolina and Virginia Experiment Stations cooperating with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The report states that fewer potatoes are thrown out or lowered in grade when the speed of digging is reduced, rubber-covered pickup baskets used, rubber tubing covering the links of the digger chain, and web belting placed along the sides of the digger frame. When the digger was used to harvest 40 acres a year, these improvements cost \$1 per acre.

Elmer Meadows, fieldman for the American Guernsey Cattle Club and H. P. Ewalt, extension dairy specialist, Oregon State College, will attend the tour and participate in the judging and in discussing various topics during the day.

Russia, Iran Sign Agreement

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Russia and Iran have signed a new barter agreement sharply stepping up Soviet shipments of industrial equipment and durable goods.

In the new pact—effective May 1, 1954, through March 31, 1955—Russia pledges to send 68 million rials worth of agricultural machinery to Iran, plus 20 million rials worth of electrical equipment. Iran will send fish, lead and tin, ore, skins and other products.

In last year's pact the total such shipment reached only 32 million rials. The rial's official rate is 32.5 to the dollar.

Wheat Allotment Reported

Farmers on land on which no wheat was seeded for grain for all of the years 1952, '53 and '54 may apply for a 1955 wheat acreage allotment, according to William J. Burnett, chairman of the Klamath County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

To be considered for an allotment on a farm which had no wheat seeded for grain for any of those years, the farmer must apply in writing to his county ASC committee by June 30, 1954.
