The service united two well known Malin families.

The candlelight ceremony was read by the Rev. Carl DeMott, in the presence of many guests and relatives of the young couple. The lovely bride, given in marriage by her father, walked down the aisle between pews marked with large white bows of satin ribbon. The altar was decorated with beauty vases of white gladioli, delphinium and woodwardia fern, before a background of white tapers in floor candelabra and woodwardia clusters.

Mrs. Albert Herringshaw, Klamath Falls, at the organ, played the traditional wedding marches and sang "Always" and "O Promise Me."

The bridal gown of white slipper satin, ankle-length, was made with a nylon net and tulle overskirt covered with lace applique.

The long sleeves were pointed over the hands. A fingertip illu-
