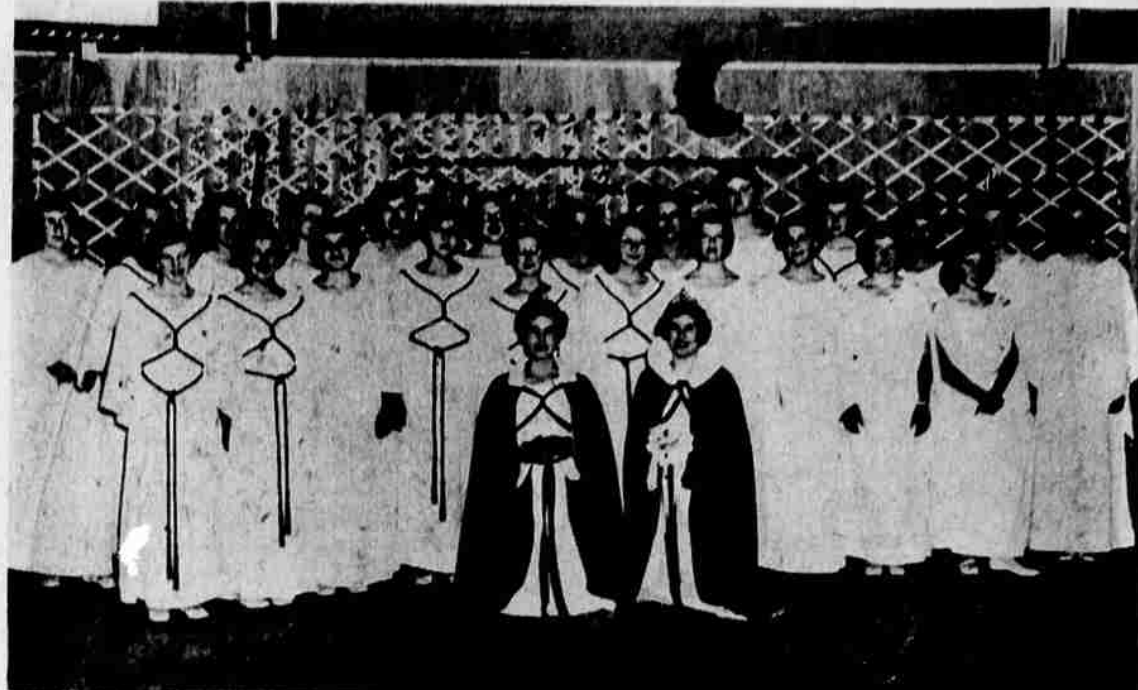

(Moran-O'Connor Wedding continued from page 9.) Earlier plans would have meant that of the three officiating priests — one would be a cousin of the bride and the other a cousin of the bridegroom. The bridegroom's cousin, the Very Rev. Father Peter Moran, Henderson, Nevada, was unable to attend. Bride's cousin assumed the duties of both.

Adding to the solemnity of the occasion was the reception of Holy Communion by the entire wedding party.

Prior to the wedding, the affianced couple received confirmation of the imparting of a Papal blessing, secured through the efforts of the celebrant, the Rev. Father Aloysius. Printed on illuminated parchment beneath a colored picture of the Holy Father, Pope Pius XII, the caption reads: "Most Holy Father, John Moran, and Kathleen O'Connor on the occasion of their marriage, humbly prostrate at the feet of Your Holiness, beg a special Apostolic Blessing." The signature of the Archbishop who made application for the blessing testifies that the Holy Father has granted the blessing. The date it was granted, May 2, is also included.

Such Papal blessings are imparted on certain important occasions, such as jubilee celebrations of clergy and religious, silver and golden wedding anniversaries. This nuptial blessing is in addition to the special proper of the Mass which is included in the liturgy for Catholic marriage ceremonies.

The main altar and side altars of the church were decorated with mass bouquets of Bells of Ireland and white delphiniums tied with gold colored ribbon. Baskets of the same flowers were placed in the sanctuary. Sprays of Bells of Ireland marked every fourth pew in the center aisle.

Sacred Heart Academy High School Choir chanted the Gregorian responses during the Mass, directed by Mrs. Ellen Sullivan who also sang the "Ave Maria" solo before the processional. Susan Vandenberg at the organ played the traditional wedding marches and accompanied the choir and soloist. Altar boys were Ming Chin, Johnny Barry, Billy Foster and Jim Novak.

The bride was given in marriage by her father. She wore a filmy gown of embroidered nylon tulle over satin. The bouffant skirt was caught by a cluster of paillettes in the manner of a Civil War belle and ended in a Cathedral train. The long sleeves came to a point over her wrists. Clusters of paillettes accented the top of the bodice.

The fingertip veil of French illusion was gathered to a lacy pearl-beaded shell-type headpiece. Kathleen's only jewelry was a single strand of pearls, gift of the bridegroom. She carried a bride's manual, gift of the Very Rev. Father Jerry O'Connor, Halley, Idaho, on which rested a single gold threaded white orchid with streamers knotted with Bells of Ireland and Stephanotis.

The old, new, borrowed, blue tradition was followed with a handkerchief, a gift of the bride's maternal grandmother, Mrs. J. R. Nolan, of Klamath Falls and Los Angeles; her gown and veil; a silver rosary belonging to her sister, Patti; a garter, gift of Mrs. Charles Drew. In her shoe was the traditional "lucky penny."

Maid of honor for her sister was Marilou O'Connor. She wore a ballerina length dress of pale green silk crystalote, fashioned in Empire lines, and two strand pearls. Her bouquet was cascade arrangement of feathered yellow carnations, Stephanotis and Bells of Ireland. The same kind of flowers were used in the headpiece.
