State Agriculture Board Meets In Klamath Falls

The State Board of Agriculture, at its semi-annual meeting here Friday, voted unanimously to submit to the 1955 legislature the urgent housing needs of the State Department of Agriculture.

He also said the board will: 1. Prepare a complete statement covering the essential requirements of the department on housing facilities for presentation to the public generally.

Lage said names of the committee would be released as soon as the committee is completed. He said the Oregon Agricultural Research and Advisory Council has already pledged its cooperation in providing adequate housing for the department activities.

Present inadequate physical conditions were only one of the angles the board scrutinized before taking its unanimous action to ask the legislature for relief, Lage said.

Oregon Sire Service Expands

Expanding its operations greatly in the past year since moving its headquarters to Eugene, Warren's Proved Sire Service now offers twice-a-day service in 12 Oregon counties, according to co-owners Ned Cahall and Chuck Warren.

Organized in Klamath Falls in 1948, Warren's claims to be the first such organization in Oregon to offer service from all proved sires, and the first to give free service to 4-H and FFA members' cows.

CIO Steel Wage Talks Recessed

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Contract negotiations between the CIO United Steel Workers and U. S. Steel Corp. are recessed today, subject to call at any time.

The committees had been meeting daily since last Saturday with the exception of the sabbath.

The union is seeking an unspecified wage boost for its members who now earn between \$2.14 and \$2.24 an hour.

The union also is asking numerous contract changes. Most important are demands for a guaranteed annual wage and improved pension and hospitalization programs.

The unions' contracts with basic steel, employing some 600,000 USW dues payers, expire midnight June 20.

SALVAGE

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—An Australian syndicate began salvage operations on the bottom of Rabaul Harbor Saturday and reported a big prize at the very outset—a Japanese aircraft carrier with 20 planes intact on its flight deck.

The syndicate has disposal rights to all ships in Rabaul and Bougainville harbor, in the Solomons.

Maine Primary Vote Watched

PORTLAND, Maine (AP)—Despite the advance balloting, it looked today—18 hours before Monday's Maine primary—as if Sen. McCarthy might not have much impact after all on a contest in this state for the Republican nomination to the Senate.

The candidates are Sen. Margaret Chase Smith of Skowhegan, seeking a second term, and Robert L. Jones of Biddeford, a freshman office seeker.

McCarthy looked like a potential issue when Jones at the outset of his campaign praised the Wisconsin Republican's concepts of Americanism. But as the campaign progressed, Jones made few references to McCarthy.

Mrs. Smith did not refer at all to the Wisconsin senator by name. She criticized conditions making for discord in government.

Up to now the campaign has produced only one major issue—the 56-year-old woman senator's Senate record.

Jones called his opponent a "do-nothing, say nothing senator."

Mrs. Smith campaigned without referring by name to her 34-year-old Biddeford rival. She changed her 1948 slogan of "don't trade a record for a promise" to "don't trade a record for a smear."

ASYLUM

TAIPEI, Formosa (AP)—Eleven Polish crewmen from the freighter Gotwald, which the Nationalists seized east of Formosa May 13, have asked for political asylum in Nationalist China, semi-official sources here said Saturday.

They will bring to 23 the number of Polish seamen granted refuge.
