Major League Pitchers Have Outstanding Day

Haddix Blanks Leaders

If some of the major league's best pitchers turned up with aching backs today they had a good excuse.

They'd been busy taking down for last night's games when in every active park in the two circuits there was at least one hurler who had covered himself with glory.

At the Polo Grounds it was Harvey Haddix of the St. Louis Cardinals. The pitcher-lefthander snapped the New York Giants' six-game winning streak with his third straight shutout, 5-0. In winning his ninth consecutive game Haddix ran his string of scoreless innings to 32, longest in the majors this season. He also increased his top-ranking strikeout total by 7 to 86 and his overall record to 11-3. Nobody else has won as many as 10. Stan Musial hit his 22nd home run, tops in both leagues.

BRIGHTEST
At Forbes Field Vern Law, one of the National League's brightest rookies, allowed Milwaukee only three singles and won the game 2-1 for Pittsburgh with a bases-loaded single in the last of the ninth. Warren Spahn, Law's mound foe, was no slouch, giving only five singles.

Corky Valentine, another rookie, outduelled Curt Simmons as Cincinnati's shaded Philadelphia 2-1. Simmons, the victim of the Phillies' weak hitting in his last two outings, drove in the only run for the losers. Wally Post collected four hits and drove in both runs for the Redlegs as Valentine carefully spaced seven safeties.

The joy in Flatbush came from Don Newcombe's first complete game. The big right-hander turned back Chicago 6-3 as the Dodgers singled the Giants' league lead to a single game. Newcombe struck out eight, all in the last six innings. Gil Hodges homered twice.

The National League had no monopoly on the outstanding performances by pitchers.

Cleveland beat Boston 2-0, New York edged Chicago 7-4, Philadelphia edged Detroit 1-0 and Washington outlasted Baltimore 7-5 in 13 innings.

And here's how the pitchers fared in the junior circuit:

Mike Garcia of the Indians turned back the Red Sox on four innings for his ninth victory. His club's ninth straight triumph and the Indians' ninth triumph in nine meetings with Boston this year.

The only solace for the Red Sox since April 24 of Mel Parnell, the lefthander, recovering from a wrist fracture, pitched one inning in relief.

Comiskey Park in Chicago a pitcher starred in a different role. Bob Grim, called in as a relief man in the fifth, won the game with his hitting. He singled home two Yankee runs in the sixth and his first major league home run with one aboard in the eighth.

HOME RUN
Grim needed help from Johnny Sain in the ninth. Phil Cavaretta reached him for a pinch hit home run and Carl Sawatski bashed a pinch hit double. Singles by Nelson Fox, his fourth hit, and Ferris Fain produced one more run by George Kell grounded out with the tying run on third.

It was the seventh time in nine games the White Sox have lost to New York and the fifth time they've lost to the Yankees by a single run.

At Briggs Stadium in Detroit young Arnold Portocarrero checked the Tigers on four hits and was in complete command after Ray Boone's first inning home run. Only a week ago the Tigers had beaten the rookie 15-3.

In Baltimore Bob Porterfield of the Senators stayed 13 innings for his eighth victory. The Orioles battered him for 16 hits but he re-singled home the two winning runs in the 13th. Mickey Vernon hit safely his first five times at bat.

The Padres ran into some really fancy pitching Friday night as Seattle's Gogy Steve Nagy beat them 3-1. Pete Hernandez was called in for relief in the ninth but the Padres were able to collect only five hits, while Seattle collected nine off the ace of the Padre staff, Ed Erault.

Nagy left the scene in the last inning when he issued two walks, but Hernandez got out of trouble by forcing the league's leading hitter, Harry Elliott, to fly out and end the game, with the bases loaded.

The villain of the San Diego game was Joe Erault, who socked one of his brother's pitches in the fourth for a double that drove in what proved to be the winning run.

The San Diego defeat put the Padres in a second place tie with Oakland, which moved up ahead of San Francisco as it defeated Los Angeles, 6-4. San Francisco was absorbing another defeat from Hollywood.

Bill Boemler ended Portland's three-game losing streak as he pitched the Beavers to a 6-1 decision over Sacramento in 10 innings. The big southpaw allowed only four hits and two of them came in the first inning.

Hardtops Feature Pot Race

Tomorrow night's hardtop racing program will be highlighted by the first special event of the season, and a continuation of a handful of feuds that could cause some added excitement for the racing fans.

The special event will be a ten lap 500 pot race driven by the first 10 drivers, who register and pay their five dollar entry fee.

Starting positions will be drawn at the track before the race gets underway and the first two or three finishers will split the pot's total.

The feuds, which have been working to a head all season, and really became noticeable last Sunday night, when some of the name drivers became entangled in a few exchanges of words and some extra curricular shoving.

These arguments, between the different drivers seem to enlighten the fans, and almost always add some sort of thrills for the hardtop enthusiasts, who attend the evening races.

Another added attraction will be the attendance of the 1954 Rodeo Queen Darlene Wineberger and her court. The lovely lassies of the saddle trails will be the guests of the track management.

Going into the sixth week of racing, the fans are still looking for a driver, who can come back and win his second main event. So far this season a different driver has won the main event prize money every week.

Bernie Miller and Cecil James of M e d i o r d were the first two winners, then Wes Owens, and Bob Crawley finished the 25 lap event first, and last week, Dale Hankins entered the winner's circle by copying the A-main money.

As the drivers and cars start the Father's Day program tomorrow, Bob Crawley in K-66 is leading the point system after the first five evenings of racing with a grand total of 117. Johnny Hilson in K-7 and Russ Newell in K-15 are fighting it out for second and third spot with 105 and 103 points respectively.

The remaining two drivers to round out the top five point getters are Wes Owens in K-16 and Al Rossi in K-42. Owens has racked up a 94 point total, while Rossi, who has been plagued by spots of bad luck so far this year, is holding on to an even 90 points.

Besides the special pot race there will be another nine events and the time trials. Four heat races, ten laps each, will get the evening show started, while a trophy dash and final heat will fill out the middle part of the program.

The C-race or consolation event will follow and then comes the B-main and the A-main to put the finishing touches on the racing menu.

Time trials will start at 6:30 and around 7:15, flagman will get the first heat race underway.

Coach Rusty Callow's Middies were reported to have broken the IIRA record for the lake in a time trial this week.

But Callow gave the trial time as 15:16 for the three miles. The record, set by Navy in winning the 1952 race, was 15:04.

Washington, Cornell and Penn are rated as having the oarsmen who might be strong enough to upset mighty Navy. However, nine of the competing coaches gave the nod to Navy in a poll.

Except for naming their crews first in the poll, both Callow and Washington coach Al Ulbrickson have stoutly refused to make any predictions.

The other shells pulling over the three mile course toward Liverpool will carry the crews from Boston University, California, Columbia, MIT, Princeton, Wisconsin and host Syracuse.

The varsity race goes off at 4 p.m. ETU.

Cornell's great Freshman crew is rated the most likely to succeed in the program opening two mile race.

Washington is the consensus to beat the other seven crews in the three-mile Junior Varsity race.
