Boy Lost On Fishing Trip

BEND (U.S.) — Search parties Monday hunted 16-year-old John David Lindstrom of Eugene, who vanished on the slopes of Three-Fingered Jack mountain, 40 miles northwest of here Sunday.

The youth had been fishing with his father, J. Orville Lindstrom, University of Oregon business manager, at Jack Lake at the foot of the mountain. He told his father he was going up the mountain to take some pictures.

When he failed to return forest rangers began a search. They traced his footprints in snow, but lost them on an icy ledge. No trace of the youth was found, however, at the bottom of the ledge.

State police, forest rangers and the State Board of Aeronautics joined in the search Monday, with both ground and air parties.

The youth had nothing to eat with him and was wearing only light clothing when he disappeared.
