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Churchill, Ike Meeting Scheduled

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill declared Tuesday Britain does not propose to lose any opportunity of improving relations with Russia "but this must be more than a one-way affair."

An authoritative source also said Churchill is now ready to commit Britain to join the proposed Southeast Asian defense alliance against communism after the Geneva Conference adjourns.

Churchill's cabinet, which met earlier, was understood to have approved such a commitment during Churchill's conferences in Washington with President Eisenhower.

Information from attending physicians and relatives of the three accident victims, received just before press time, indicate all are doing as well as could be expected.

Klamath County's eighth fatality of the year occurred shortly after 4 p.m. Monday when Janis Horne, 16, one of nine teenagers riding in a '46 Mercury sedan, lost her life when the car went out of control on the Upper Klamath Lake west side highway about 15 miles northwest of here.

Several of the lesser injured were taken to the hospital by passing motorists and the five most seriously hurt were brought in by Kaler's Ambulance Service. Janis Horne was dead upon arrival at the hospital, according to attendants.

Des Moines Braces For High Water

DES MOINES (AP)—The greatest flood crest in history rolled down the Des Moines River Valley in central Iowa today as the statewide peril from marauding rivers continued.

The only cheerful note in the disastrous four-day-old floods was a forecast of generally fair weather for several days.

At Boone, 40 miles north of Des Moines, the river was expected to crest today at an all-time high of 23 1/2 feet, nearly four feet above the previous record.

In The Day's News

By FRANK JENKINS You may or may not have been following the flood situation in the corn belt—especially in the rich bottoms of central Iowa, where the Des Moines river and the Racoon river come together at the city of Des Moines, the state capital.

Let's keep this in mind: These floods, coming at the height of the growing season, happen in rich agricultural Iowa, generally regarded as the cream of the corn and hog Middle West, as often as frosts happen in the rich agricultural Klamath Basin.

And, in London this morning, Churchill tells the British parliament: "Britain, however, doesn't propose to lose any opportunity of improving relations with Russia."

At United Nations in New York yesterday, the Russians cast their 60th veto since U.N. was organized against a motion to refer the Guatemalan complaint of aggression to the Organization of American States—which is a regional organization of the Western Hemisphere.

U.N. Council President Henry Cabot Lodge attacked the Russian veto as showing plainly that the Russians have designs on Latin America. He warned: "I say to the soviet delegate: STAY OUT OF THE WESTERN HEMISPHERE. Don't try to start your plans and conspiracies here."
