**Steel Wage Talks Eyed**  
PITTSBURGH (AP)—Industrialists and consumers kept a close watch on this steel capital today, hopeful of getting an inkling whether 600,000 employees of the basic steel industry will win contract concessions which ultimately could mean higher prices for the thousands of articles made of steel.

David J. McDonald, president of the CIO United Steelworkers, prepared to report to his Executive Board and the union's powerful 170-man Wage Policy Committee on contract talks with U. S. Steel Corp.

The union, which received an 8 1/2 cent hourly raise last year, asked for an unspecified wage hike.

McDonald also urged liberalized hospitalization and pension programs, as well as other contract changes.

Big steel kept mum on what it would offer, if anything. And union leaders didn't comment on what progress, if any, they made in the bargaining talks which recessed last Friday subject to recall at any time.

There has been considerable speculation that big steel would not agree to a wage hike—at least not a large one—but would go along with better pensions and liberalized hospitalization programs.

The union also demanded a guaranteed annual wage. It was thought big steel might agree to study the proposal.

Contracts with basic steel producers expire at midnight, June 30.

**American Joins Rebel Insurgents**

ALBUQUERQUE (AP)—Joseph Rendon, who disclosed Guatemala's revolutionary 10-day eight days before the battle trumpet sounded, today was somewhere in Central America with warring political exiles.

Although his exact whereabouts remained unknown, all indications were that the former New Mexico congressional candidate was working closely with exiled "liberation army" leaders either in Guatemala or Tegucigalpa, Honduras.

Rendon disclosed the exile's invasion plan in a letter postmarked June 10 from Honduras. Written to an Albuquerque friend, it said: "Plans are to start an invasion for the weekend of the 13th which means your pal will be in the middle of blood and thunder about Friday, Saturday or Sunday, June 18, 19, 20."

The invading forces stormed into Guatemala June 18.

Rendon, during World War II, was an OSS agent in Central America for the United States. He stayed in Guatemala after the war and later returned to New Mexico. In 1952, he attempted to gain the Democratic nomination for land commissioner but was disqualified when it was discovered he was a registered Republican. He was defeated in his bid for the Republican congressional nomination in the New Mexico primary last May 4.

It is believed to be highly regarded by the Guatemalan exiles.

It was reported last week Rendon was aboard a plane which dropped pamphlets over Guatemala City several weeks ago, forcing a closing of the airways. Rendon said, "That is a fact I can neither confirm nor deny."

In Washington, the State Department said it "looks with disfavor" on any U.S. citizen who gets involved in the Guatemalan civil uprising. In its most drastic action, the U.S. government could cancel the passport of a U.S. citizen fighting as a soldier of fortune. This would remove the protection of the United States in the event of capture.

Otherwise, except for censure, there is little the United States can do.

**Chinese, Indian Meeting Planned**

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—An Indian government spokesman said today Red China's Premier Chou En-lai will arrive here Thursday for a conference with Prime Minister Nehru.

His visit will be the first by a top Chinese official to India since the Communist regime was installed in Peiping in September, 1949. Observers here speculated that Nehru would return the visit with a trip to Peiping later this year. He already has been invited by the Chinese government.

Nehru had been scheduled to depart today for a 10-day rest at the hill resort of Simla. He postponed his departure to see Chou.

Observers believe the Chinese leader's visit may presage a more active Indian hand in the Indo-China peace problem.
