Retirement Plan Reported

Plans were completed today for a retirement income plan for employees of Klamath Falls Creamery.

Of the 80 employees at Klamath Falls Creamery, 29 are now eligible, having at least three years service with the firm and being 25 years of age or older.

The program was set up through the local office of Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States whose local manager is John Houston.

Future service benefits are on a contributory basis, with Klamath Falls Creamery paying the cost of the insurance at a ratio of two and one-half to one.

"It offers the security of a comfortable income for life after retirement," stated Robert Kent, secretary of the company.

Labor Leaders Hear Governor

ASTORIA (AP)—Gov. Paul Patterson of Oregon has no intention of intervening in the lumber strike.

He told delegates to the annual State Federation of Labor convention Monday that he is willing to lend his offices to assist in peace talks, but that it is not the function of government to intervene in such a dispute.

Patterson nevertheless expressed hope a settlement could be reached quickly. He said more than half of the state's annual income comes from lumbering.

Town Inoculated By One Doctor

ANSLEY, Neb. (AP)—A country doctor who travels 15 miles daily from his home at Broken Bow to this little town of 711 persons is working alone to inoculate the entire population against polio.

He is Dr. Clyde Wilcox and he said last night he expects to have the job done by the end of the week. He started on it last week after five confirmed cases and four suspect cases of polio were reported.

Dr. Wilcox said, "Everybody got scared but beyond that there isn't much exciting about it." He said he thought the situation was under control now.

Ike Jokes About Marines

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower, an Army man himself, jokingly remarked Tuesday that the Army is always "doing something for the Marines."

He made the observation at a White House ceremony when he signed an order establishing the first official seal for the Marine Corps in its 178 years of existence.

Sen. Case (R-SD) and seven House members, all former Marines, witnessed the ceremony along with high military leaders, including Gen. Lemuel C. Shepherd Jr., a commandant of the Marine Corps.

Mindful of the fact that the heraldic branch of the Army designed the seal, Sen. Case told the President: "This is where the Army does something for the Marine Corps."

"We always do," Eisenhower replied with a smile.

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French Leader To Meet Reds

PARIS (AP)—Premier Pierre Mendes-France will leave Paris Tuesday night to meet Chinese Communist Premier Chou En-Lai at Bern, Switzerland.

Mendes-France, who has promised to obtain peace in Indochina by July 20 or resign, will meet Chou at the French embassy at Bern.

Earlier Mendes-France had planned to go to Geneva, where the nine-power conference on Indochina is still in session. His decision to go to Bern was prompted apparently by Chou's scheduled departure Wednesday for New Delhi.

Chou will confer with India's Prime Minister Nehru there on Thursday.

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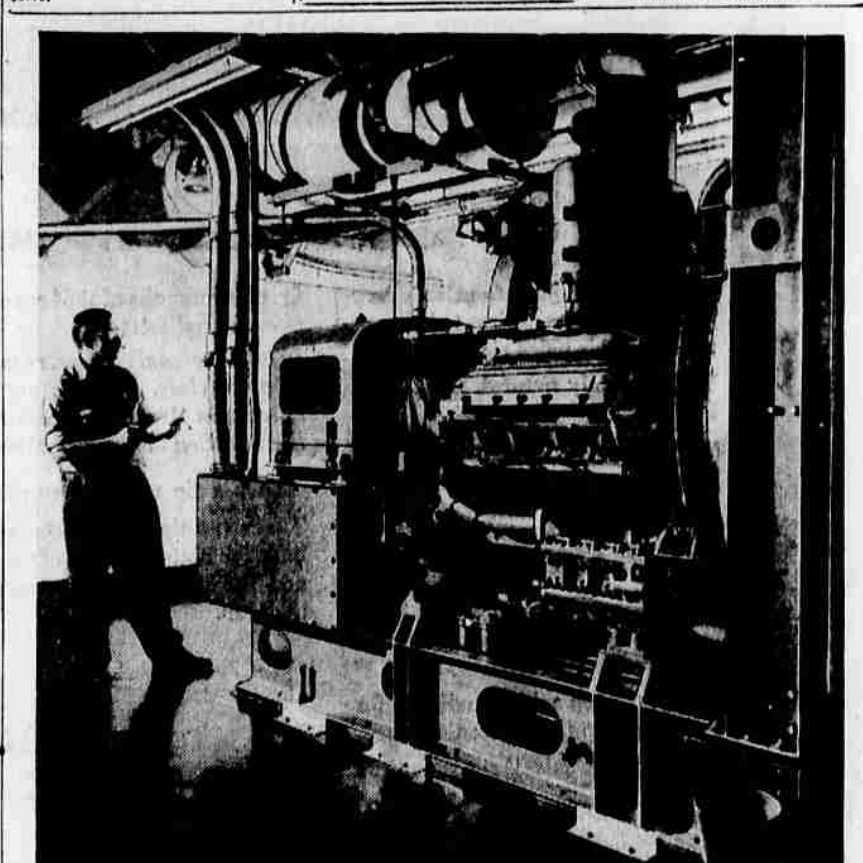
