

Committee Cuts West Dam Funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate-House conference committee recommended appropriating 36 million dollars for construction work on the Dalles Dam in the year beginning July 1 Monday. The conferees agreed on 27 million dollars for Chief Joseph Dam.

Both figures are below appropriations previously approved by the Senate. They still must be accepted by members of each chamber.

The appropriation for the Dalles is 2 million under the Senate figure but 7 million over the total approved in the House. The 27 million dollars for Chief Joseph is the figure approved by the House but is 3 million under the total okayed by the Senate.

In other actions, the committee reduced funds for a Lower Columbia fish sanctuary from \$1,250,000 to 1 million, eliminated \$500,000 approved by the Senate for the planning John Day Dam on the Columbia, and accepted the Senate figure of \$3,800,000 for Albeni Falls Dam in Idaho.

Also approved were \$125,000 for planning on Hills Creek reservoir in Oregon; \$170,000 for planning on Eagle Gorge Dam, Wash., and \$10,000 for flood control planning at Colfax, Wash.

The House and Senate previously had agreed on these appropriations:

Lookout Point Dam, Ore., 3 million dollars; McNary Dam, 24 million dollars; Pendleton project planning, \$150,000; Willamette River bank protection, \$300,000; and Lucky Peak Dam, Idaho, \$1,750,000.

Both figures are below appropriations previously approved by the Senate. They still must be accepted by members of each chamber.

The appropriation for the Dalles is 2 million under the Senate figure but 7 million over the total approved in the House. The 27 million dollars for Chief Joseph is the figure approved by the House but is 3 million under the total okayed by the Senate.

Cougar Visits Local Ranch

The cry of a cougar at dusk, Saturday evening, June 19, startled Mrs. Otis Metesker, resident of Shady Pine, as she fed calves in the feed lot on the L. W. Harroun ranch, eight miles north of Klamath Falls on the old highway.

Mrs. Metesker looked up to see the animal stretched on a log inside the corral fence. She called for her husband, who was at the house, but before he arrived with a gun the cougar had leaped the fence and disappeared into the forest.

Jerry Martin, owner of trained cougar hounds, was called to the ranch but no further trace of the animal was found. Men and dogs hunted the rocky hillside until after dark.

Residents of the area are familiar with a cougar family that rears young in a cave on the hill and Mrs. Metesker believes the one she saw was probably a half grown cub.

Young lambs nearby were probably a target for the nocturnal visitor.

Annexation Vote Planned

City Council members were assured Monday night that a new business building will be under construction within 15 days at 9th and Main street.

Mrs. Angelo Doveri, owner of the site, said work will be started as soon as Pat's cab moves its office from the lot.

A barricade around the site where a disastrous fire occurred last winter, has aroused the ire of surrounding property owners. Delegations have appeared before the council demanding the barrier be removed.

Mrs. Doveri said it was impossible for her to start work on a new building sooner.

At a brief council session, Clyde Walsh, a resident of the Claremont Hotel, 228 N. 4th St., filed a protest against what he described as a "serious fire hazard" at the hotel. He said debris had been allowed to accumulate around the place and that the heating plant in the place is unsafe.

Walsh was told the fire department had already notified the manager of the hotel to remedy the situation.

An ordinance calling for a special election on July 23 to give voters a chance to express their views on proposed annexation of a 50-acre area southeast of the city limits was passed. There are 400 property owners in the district.

GOP Women Plan Meeting

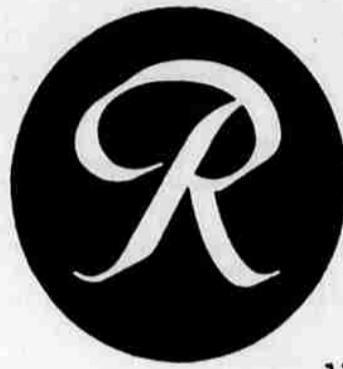
