### New Movies Reviewed By Writer

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Lets take a look at some of the current and forthcoming movies —  
"Demetrius and the Gladiators" is a clear and unabashed attempt to cash in on the popularity of "The Robe." Using some of the same sets and actors plus a fragment of the original theme, the sequel tosses in a large supply of sex and violence for good measure. The result is entertaining if not very uplifting.  
"Living It Up" is perhaps the best of the Martin and Lewis romps. For once, they have a sub-

stantial vehicle — taken from the Broadway show "Hazel Flagg," which was taken from the movie "Nothing Sacred." When the film sticks to the whimsy of the plot, it's wonderful. It is not so good when it relies on the standard Martin and Lewis routines.  
"Magnificent Obsession" is a pleasant dose of message and sentiment. The old Robert Taylor-Irene Dunne movie has been remade with Rock Hudson, Jane Wyman and color. The story seems old-fashioned, but the message is as important today as ever.  
"The Student Prince" is yet an-

other remake. During the early moments, you wonder: Why did they drag out this old piece of claptrap? But then you get into the swing of it and you see how these old operettas charmed an earlier generation.  
"The Caine Mutiny" measures up to the bigness of its story.  
"About Mrs. Leslie" rambles on in the manner of a serial in a woman's magazine. In plodding style, it tells the story of a mature woman who spends six weeks each year as the companion to a married public figure. What brings the tale alive is the glowing per-

### Burning Kills Pheasant Feed

Farmer spare that pheasant could well be the cry at this time of the year when tradition dictates that summer fallow be burned.  
In an article in the Baker Democrat Herald, county extension agent John Hesketh wrote the following on the subject.  
"I have just learned of another good argument against the practice of burning summer fallow."  
"Karl Morton, district game agent of the Oregon State Game Commission, was in the other day and reported making a check on a stubble field he saw being burned early in May. The check revealed that seven pheasant nests had been destroyed in approximately 25 acres of grain stubble.  
"If burning must be done, Karl points out that stubble, weed patches, and fence rows burned before April 1 would result in little chance of interference in the regular nesting habits of pheasants. Anytime after this date, nests are apt to be destroyed, and although pheasants will often build new ones, the later in the season this destruction occurs, the less likelihood that they will re-nest.  
According to the Oregon State Game Commission, the destruction of seven nests in this one field eliminated a possible hatch of 70 pheasants since the clutches would average at least 10 eggs per nest.
