Governor Closes Vice Ridden City

PHENIX CITY, Ala. (AP)—Bill collectors for a big Georgia furniture store took in only \$2 from their usual rounds in Phenix City the day after racketeer-Phenix A. L. Patterson was slain.

The long-summering cauldron of vice had boiled over into gangster-like violence at last in a complacent community where gambling, liquor and prostitution were the most flourishing industries. Its people, stunned into reality and afraid of the future, were holding out their money "until we find out what we're going to do."

A feeling of desperation was evident throughout the once carefree city of 23,000 where soldiers from nearby Ft. Benning, Ga., came each night to lounge in the girls bars and gamble away their pay.

Georgia authorities couldn't regulate the vice dens and Alabama didn't control them, except at intervals when the lid came down and then gradually lifted again.

Phenix City is closed again now, tighter than ever. And Gov. Gordon Persons has vowed to keep it that way—at least until he leaves office next January.

One immediate effect, the governor hopes, may be to "slave out" the killer who gunned Patterson to death last Friday night before he could take office as attorney general and begin the vice cleanup he had promised.

The gamblers and the vice lords have been hit hard by the clampdown, enforced by National Guardsmen, and the "off limits" signs posted around the city for soldiers from Ft. Benning.

One gambler alone complained that the loss of business was costing him \$1,000 a day.

Prostitutes fled across the Chattahoochee River into Columbus, Ga., but authorities there ordered them out. As far away as Montgomery, 85 miles to the west, the city commission ordered a vice crackdown to keep the girls on the move.

But there is a far more ominous cloud hovering over this Chattahoochee River town. Its entire economy may fall apart.

Alton V. Foster, the Chamber of Commerce manager who resigned in angry protest after Patterson's murder, said the cleanup order will "ruin the city financially." It remains in force, but he added:

"It would be the best thing that could happen. Even if it means the city has to go into receivership again, it will be worth the sacrifice if a healthy new community can grow up in its place."

Phenix City went bankrupt during the depression and stayed in receivership 15 years.

In 1952, Phenix City's municipal income was \$649,679, and one way or another, gambling and its kindred vices accounted for nearly one-half of the total tax receipts.

HST Bothered By Midwest Heat

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Temperatures near the 100-degree mark bothered former President Harry S. Truman, recovering from an operation, but he declined to move to a cooler room in the hospital yesterday.

His condition remained satisfactory. Dr. Wallace Graham said Truman "is feeling pretty good but he's been bothered a little by a penicillin rash. And he won't let us move him into a cooler room."

The 70-year-old former President underwent surgery last Sunday for removal of his gall bladder and appendix.

Mrs. Ila Mae Kampschroeder, a special night nurse at Research Hospital, called Truman a fine patient.

"Unlike a lot of important people, he's very cooperative," she said. "He's very human and understands pain marvelously."

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Planet Said Covered By 'Soda' Water

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—If and when any space navigators ever reach the planet Venus, they'd better be equipped with rowboats—because two Harvard astronomers today offered a new theory that "an ocean of water completely covers the planet."

And, presumably, the spaceship itself would have to be equipped with parking pontoons—or at least an outboard motor.

But take heart, you would-be spacemen. The astronomers said it may be an ocean of "carbonated" water—not too bad for a sociable Scotch and soda as you pull on the oars.

"Because of the large amount of carbon dioxide in the Venusian atmosphere, the ocean would probably consist of seizer water, although I dare say it would be rather flat," Dr. Donald Menzel smilingly told a reporter.

He and Dr. Fred Whipple presented a joint report on the subject to the annual meeting of the American Astronomical Society, convened at the University of Michigan.

Their concept differs sharply from a common one that Venus is an arid desert with little or no water, and where the temperature may be more than hot enough to boil water anyway.

The scientists offered a series of arguments against a common concept that the thick bank of clouds that entirely envelopes the planet consists of dust—not of Bulwark of the older concept was that there is no evidence of water in the spectrum of Venus' light as studied on Earth.

Refugees Land In America

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower's refugee relief program is picking up speed after months of delay from security checks and red tape.

Slated to disembark at New York today was the 10-member family of Jan Koetler and 24 other immigrants traveling aboard the steamship Zouider Kruls from Rotterdam, Holland.

Yesterday saw the arrival of the largest shipload so far since the program was officially launched last Aug. 7. The S. S. Conte Biancamano, with 201 men, women and children from Italy seeking homes in the New World.

Until then, only 48 refugees had entered this country under the program, which calls for admission of 214,000 persons over and above regulation immigration quotas for a three-year period ending Dec. 31, 1956. With the new arrivals, the total is 263.

More important, perhaps, State Department officials in charge of the program report 2,601 visas have been issued in a half dozen participation countries.

These officials say the number of visas issued is more important than the number of immigrants who actually step off the boat. Generally speaking, they report, a refugee does not begin to pack or scrape up the money for the trip until he gets a visa—the official U. S. paper which says he can come into the country.

Under the refugee relief program, successful applicants must have a sponsor who will give assurances of suitable employment and housing. No Communist party members or affiliates are admissible, nor are persons with a contagious disease.

The 10 members of the Koetler family—Jan, 56, his wife Christina, 55, their 4 sons, 2 daughters and 1 son-in-law—are headed for California.

A fifth son—25-year-old Henry, 6742 Moody Street, Buena Park, Calif.—became a naturalized American last Oct. 14 and is vouching for the new entrants, as required by law.

The 2,601 applicants granted visas up to June 18 include 1,938 in Italy, 645 in Greece, 63 in the Austria and 23 in Japan. Netherlands, 112 in Germany, 20 in

DUESSELDORF, Germany (AP)—American evangelist Billy Graham became seriously ill today and a German doctor ordered him to a hospital for a complete physical checkup, Graham's secretary said.

"Billy woke up awfully sick this morning," the secretary, Jerry Beavan, told newsmen. "We called a doctor. The doctor looked him over and recommended he be sent to a hospital immediately for a complete checkup."

Beavan said he did not know what ailed Graham.

The 35-year-old evangelist came to Germany Wednesday after a tour of Britain and Scandinavia. He was scheduled to leave here today on a three-day visit to Berlin.

Graham had appeared in excellent health yesterday despite the rigors of his strenuous revival schedule. German newspapers commenting on his appearance in Frankfurt said he looked "fresh, brilliant and as boyish as an English tennis champion."
