## Hollywood Stages Campaign To Sell Movie Processes

HOLLYWOOD — The battle of the dimensions still rages. This week saw much activity in behalf of new movie techniques. Paramount's deluxe huckster, William Holden, was circling the globe to sell the studio's process, VistaVision, which is demonstrating its super scope throughout the United States.

And in Hollywood, the press trooped out to see two new developments. One was the long-awaited Todd-Ao process, in which "Oklahoma!" will be filmed.

It's good, mighty good, in fact, it may be the best. The screen, it is broad, slightly curved and taller than the ribbon-like cinemascope. It excels in clarity. The film is 35mm instead of the normal 35mm.

## Bonneville Payment Told

PORTLAND — The Bonneville Power Administration will pay \$50,877,210 into the federal treasury for the fiscal year ending June 30, the biggest year-end payment in its history.

Last year the payments, from power receipts, totaled \$34,500,000. This year, for the first time, there will be these payments through fund transfers on Hungry Horse project, \$5,087,210; McNary, \$4,589,000; Detroit-Big Cliff, \$1,500,000; and Albion Falls \$475,000.

The Columbia Basin (Grand Coulee) project payment, Administrator William A. Pearl said, will be \$12,532,000, that on Bonneville Dam \$3,350,000, and on the transmission system and power operations \$23,300,000.

## Water Resources Group To Meet

Portland, Oregon, will be the scene of the fifth and final scheduled public hearing of the Task Force on Water Resources and Power (Hoover Commission). This hearing will take place on Monday and Tuesday, June 28 and 29, in Portland's City Council chambers.

Admiral Ben Moreell, chairman of the Task Force, said today that more than 60 organizations and individuals have asked to be heard or to have statements entered for the record in the Task Force's proceedings in Portland.

The Task Force has held previous hearings in San Francisco, Denver, Chattanooga, and New York City.

The Portland hearings will open at 9 o'clock Monday morning, with 18 members of the Task Force in attendance. Several members of the Task Force have undertaken a field inspection of developments on the Columbia River, starting on June 24. By the time the Portland hearing opens, this group will have visited Bonneville and The Dalles, McNary Dam, Grand Coulee, Chief Joseph Dam and Wenatchee.

## Remington Parole Bid Turned Down

WASHINGTON — The Justice Department says William W. Remington, former Commerce Department economist serving time for perjury, has failed in a bid for parole from the federal penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pa.

The Department said yesterday Remington, 36, applied for a parole April 25, shortly after he completed the first year of a three-year prison term imposed after he was convicted in New York of lying when he denied knowing of a Young Communist League unit at Dartmouth in the 1930s.

The parole application was turned down June 17, the department said.

## Two Children Unhurt By Fall

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Two 18-month-old girls fell together from the third-story window of an apartment building yesterday but neither appeared badly hurt.

The children, Donna Renee Webb and Rickey Dianne Weldon, landed in a gutter about three feet wide, just missing a concrete wall.

Their mothers, Mrs. Donald Webb and Mrs. Charles Weldon, said they were looking at pictures in the Webb apartment while the children were playing near a window.

The mothers heard a screen fall, whirled and saw both children plunge head first from the window.

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## KF Doctors Attend Meet

Several Klamath Falls doctors attended the 103rd annual convention of the American Medical Association which convened this week in San Francisco.

Some 11,000 doctors and an additional 20,000 nurses, technicians and members of doctor's families were present.

Headquarters were at the Palace Hotel. The annual meet is held on the West Coast every four years.

Among those attending from here were Dr. George I. Wright, who has practiced in Klamath Falls since 1902. He is a member of the graduating class of 1908 from Northwestern University and during the convention met three members of his class. He also attended the dinner for Northwestern alumni and staff members.

## Jail Chosen Over Work

Raymond Elissa Phillips, 44-year old itinerant sign painter, who admitted to police he begged his way through 25 states with his wife and infant daughter, convinced District Judge D. E. Van Vactor Friday afternoon that he would rather go to jail than work.

Phillips appeared before Judge Van Vactor for sentencing after his conviction on a charge of vagrancy.

The judge explained he was concerned over the plight of the painter's wife and child who were being cared for by county welfare officials.

"I believe we have found a job so you can take care of your family," the judge explained.

"What kind of work?" the defendant asked.

"It's driving stakes for a carnival that is setting up out at the circus grounds," the judge told him.

"Can't do that, judge," Phillips said. "I don't drink and I don't smoke and I'm against shows."

"I'll give you something you can do," the judge declared. "Thirty days in the county jail."

## Famed Airman Awarded Medal

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP)—The fastest traveling human today receives the Distinguished Service Medal for flying a rocket plane more than 1,600 mph.

The recipient is Maj. Charles E. Yeager, U.S. Air Force pilot who was also the first man to fly faster than sound. He made the 1,600 mph flight Dec. 12, 1953, in a Bell X-1A research plane.

After reaching top speed at 70,000 feet altitude his streaking ship went out of control but he regained control of it at about 20,000 feet.

Yeager first cracked the sonic barrier in 1947.
