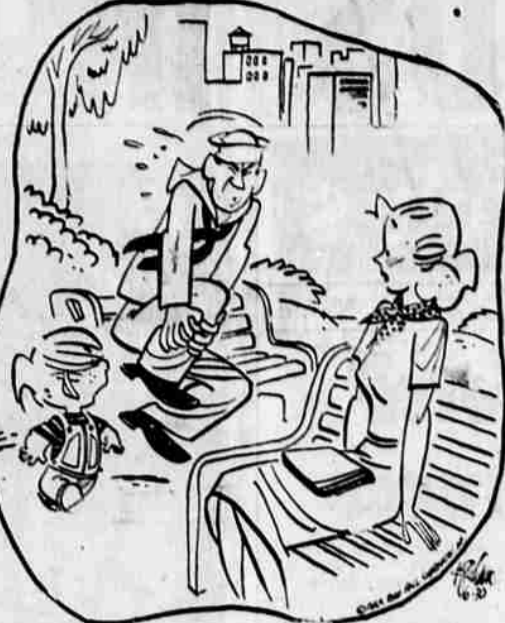

Walt Disney To Present TV Series

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Walt Disney will take you there on TV this fall.
 The amazing Mr. Disney, whose wonders never cease, is preparing a TV series called "Disneyland" for the ABC network. A monthly feature will be "The World of To-

morrow," and one of the subjects will show the preparation and actual flight to Mars.
 The red planet is a timely topic, since it is veering close enough to the earth this month for astronomers to get their best squint at it.
 To conduct this TV trip to Mars, Disney has hired Willy Ley, who knows as much about space travel as any human being. He formed a society for space travel in his native Germany in 1927, the same year Lindbergh made headlines with an earthy flight. He came to this country in 1935 and continued advocating flight into space by writing books and articles.
 "A flight to Mars?" asks Ley in Germanic tones. "Of course it is possible. All it takes is time and money."
 It could happen in 25 years, he said. Or at least 25 years after the decision is made to attempt

Agreement On Trieste Dispute Seen

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP)—An Italian-Yugoslav settlement of the long and bitter Trieste dispute is expected momentarily by responsible diplomats here.
 Barring a last-minute hitch, they say, announcement of agreement should come within the next two weeks.
 A settlement would end one of Europe's thorniest postwar problems. Coming at this time, it also would realize a desire of the United States and Britain to put the Italian-Yugoslav feud aside before Yugoslavia, Greece and Turkey conclude a proposed Balkan military alliance.
 The "Little Three" foreign ministers are scheduled to sign the alliance in Yugoslavia's summer capital of Belgrade between July 12 and 18. Final negotiations on terms of the pact are now under way in Athens.
 Trieste Free Territory, an area about the size of metropolitan New York City, was set up in 1947 under terms of the peace treaty with Italy. At the time the Allies were unable to determine whether it should be given to Italy or Yugoslavia.
 For administrative purposes it was divided into two zones. Zone A, including the big port city of Trieste, was placed under British-American control and is occupied by 7,000 British and American troops.
 Zone B—about two thirds of the whole territory but only one third of the population of 300,000—was placed under Yugoslav control.
 Both Italy and Yugoslavia claimed the whole territory.
 In an effort to settle the dispute, the United States and Britain announced last Oct. 8 they would withdraw their troops from Zone A and turn it over to Italy.
 The decision provoked strong protests, riots and saber rattling on both sides of the Adriatic. The troops stayed.
 When agreement comes, it is expected to parallel closely—territorially at least—the Allies' Oct. 8 decision. However, there will be two major differences so far as Yugoslavia is concerned.
 The solution will be the result of negotiations and consultations in which Yugoslavia was included—not the case before Oct. 8. Yugoslavia leaders learned of that decision only two hours before it was announced.

Navy To Modify Plane Catapults

NEW YORK (AP)—The Navy will modify the plane-launching catapults on all but two aircraft carriers as a result of the May 26 explosion aboard the carrier Bennington. The disaster cost more than 100 lives.
 A Navy official said yesterday all carriers affected by the modification plan have catapults operated on a hydraulic principle, except the Intrepid and the Hancock, which have steam catapults.

 He will speak for 15 minutes, starting at 8:45 p.m., EDT. ABC radio and Du Mont television will air the talk live. Other networks have scheduled later rebroadcasts.

Annual Fund Bills Passed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Hurry to beat a midnight deadline, Congress Wednesday passed and sent to the White House the final three annual appropriations bills for the new fiscal year starting Thursday.
 The Senate completed action on the measures within an hour after the House had passed them.
 The three measures provide funds for the State, Justice and Commerce Departments; the Labor and Welfare Departments; and the judicial and legislative branches of government.
 The bills were compromises of different measures passed previously by the House and the Senate.
 They make these appropriations: Legislative Department, \$70,695,754; federal judiciary, \$27,501,740; Labor Department and Related agencies, \$311,784,500; Welfare Department, \$1,163,413,761; State Department, \$114,110,000; Justice Department, \$178,954,500; Commerce Department, \$837,022,000; U. S. Information Agency, \$77,114,000.
 The total of \$3,278,506,255 in the bills cleared Wednesday is approximately \$100,000,000 less than President Eisenhower requested last January.

PRO-LABOR
 WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary James P. Mitchell told a Labor Department employees' pep session yesterday that Eisenhower administration policies are "pro-labor."
 "Despite what you may hear to the contrary," Mitchell said, "I ask you to look at the facts, look at the President's program for health and social legislation. No one can say that this is not pro-labor."
