WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Commerce Weeks Wednesday announced apportionment of \$75 million dollars in federal highway aid for what he said would be "the greatest surge in highway construction in the history of America."

The money will be doled out to the states and territories during the fiscal year beginning a year from Thursday as they put up matching funds and make highway improvement expenditures.

New York got the biggest allotment—over 56 million dollars. Vermont got the smallest—4 million.
