

### GOC To Enter Parade Float

The Klamath Falls Ground Observer Corps will enter a float and a marching unit in the Roundup Parade July 5, according to an announcement by Russ Avery, GOC supervisor.

The float will portray the aftermath of a bombing, and is being worked out in detail by a committee consisting of all-veterans. The idea for the theme came from

Gloria Elliott, an enthusiastic GOC volunteer.

In addition to the float and GOC marching unit, permission has been granted by city council to drop pamphlets from a plane advertising the Ground Observer Corps. Lloyd (Pop) Newton of Meent-Newton Aircraft Corp. will pilot the plane.

### Bonanza Fund Drive Held

**BONANZA** — A group of some two dozen people under the chairmanship of Fred Hueck made personal calls on citizens residing in the Bonanza, Dairy, Langel Valley area last week asking donations to keep the Bonanza cemetery on a working basis.

A goal of \$1000 has been set, which is the minimum limit under which the cemetery can operate. Of this sum \$1200 goes for the caretaker's salary. While the total bill short of the goal a sizeable contribution was made.

About \$800 was taken in at the dinner on Decoration Day, one of the largest crowds in a long time attending. Out of this total \$1500 went for expenses.

Other items of expense included \$150 for new sprinkler heads and \$70 for gas and oil used in hauling fill dirt for the area. The monthly electricity bill for pumping and other purposes is about \$30.

### Angler Lost In Deschutes River

**BEND** (P) — An angler was swept away from his wife and two friends by the swift Deschutes River Wednesday. He was presumed drowned.

The victim was Samuel Mowery, 51, an employee of the state hospital at Salem, who was on a fishing trip to the Pringle Falls area, 35 miles south of here.

He was upstream from his wife and Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Smith, also of Salem, when he fell in unobserved. The current carried him past them before they could make a rescue try.

They said he grabbed for a limb, but failed to reach it. Then he disappeared.

### Negro Leader Gives Views

**NEW YORK** (P) — The director of the United Nations Division of Trusteeship, Dr. Ralph Bunche, is a Negro.

He is strongly in favor of desegregation.

But, he told the 92d annual convention of the National Education Assoc. last night, he thinks it can sometimes be carried too far.

He said he had accepted an invitation at the University of Arkansas after receiving assurances that the Fayetteville audience would not be segregated. Afterwards, he said, the man in charge saw him to his train and sheepishly confessed:

"You know, when you wrote and asked about segregation we were in a spot. We had no intention of segregating the meeting, but the fact is that there are only about 15 Negroes in this whole county, and they are mostly sharecroppers who wouldn't turn out to hear Booker T. Washington himself."

"So, just to make sure you wouldn't think we were cheating you, we sent runners all the way to Little Rock and Pine Bluff to drum up enough Negroes to make a showing."

"I think that's carrying desegregation too far," Bunche told his audience. "and I think some of those Negroes who traveled 250 miles to hear me speak thought so too."

### Former KF Man In Guatemala

A former Klamath Falls resident Robert (Bob) Burke son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Burke, 1941 Del Moro Street, has been near the recent fighting in Guatemala but has not been in any immediate danger.

Burke is production manager for Compania-Minera De Guatemala, an American lead and silver mining operation located at Coban, about 60 miles from Guatemala City, capital of the country. Burke is a mining engineer and has spent the past three years in Central

America, accompanied by his wife Nina. He is a University of Oregon graduate. Earlier in June Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Burke visited with their son and daughter-in-law in Mexico City.
