

Out Of Doors With The Sportsman

Good fishing weather has finally found its way to the Klamath Basin, and the average angler is beginning to notice the difference in enjoyment and the number of fish caught, from the preceding weekends of angling.

Last weekend, the weather was a little chilly in some spots, as a cold wind hit the area, but there was also a surprisingly number of limits and other near limits reported this past week.

The Williamson and Wood Rivers were just two of the close-in streams that local anglers had good luck on over the two day weekend, while Lake of the Woods and Fish Lake also produced some catches to anglers trolling and still fishing these waters.

On the Williamson, spin fishing, and trolling seems to have had the edge over bait fishing the past few days, although some nice sized fish have been taken from the Upper Basin stream on worms and single eggs.

Doc Sheltons, number five and six, along with hammered silver Ford Fenders were bringing re-

luck, while single eggs, bright or medium in color, will probably satisfy the still fisherman.

Odell Lake was still going fairly good. Both with trout and mackinaws over the last few weeks.

Trolling with the U-20 silver scale Flat Fish seems to be the most profitable for the big mackinaws.

Kimball Park, north of the Sun Mountain-Fort Klamath Junction, has been another hot spot the past few days, with some nice trout being taken from the mouth of the Wood on the new red and white Woble Rites. The red and white Daredevil should also work in these waters.

Crappie and bass fishing has hit the increase this past week, with Gerber Reservoir and Hyatt Lake, in Jackson County, getting hot as a fire cracker on crappie, and Lost River and Lake of the Woods for bass.

The streamer fly, all colors, seems to work best for the bass, while the yellow bodied-red headed Hot Sheel, number 705, seems to be the best producer for crappie at Gerber. The silver badger has produced some good results on the

Drobny, Rosewall In Finals

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Wily Jaroslav Drobny, "the best player never to win at Wimbledon," gets his third chance at tennis' biggest title today when he meets young Ken Rosewall of Australia for the Wimbledon singles championship.

Drobny, now 32, will be the oldest Wimbledon champion since Bill Tilden broke the six-year French monopoly in 1920 if his drop shots and cute stuff prove too much for the 19-year-old Aussie ace. Rosewall, on the other hand, would be the youngest champion since 1891, when a 16-year-old named W. Baddeley won the title.

Drobny, more popular than ever with English fans since he announced his intention of seeking English citizenship recently, is known here as "The Grey Fox of Center Court." He bowed to Ted Schroeder on the famed court in 1949 and to Frank Sedgman three years later. In addition, he has lost in the semifinals six times.

Rosewall will be playing in the final for the first time.

The bookmakers have made youth and speed a 1-2 favorite. The seedings agree, with Rosewall No. 3 to Drobny's No. 11.

Yesterday, the top-seeded doubles pair, Rex Hartwig and Mervyn Rose of Australia, whipped America's Budge Patty of Los Angeles and Paris and Gardner Mulloy of Coral Gables, Fla., 4-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-1 in one semifinal.

In the other, the second-ranked pair of Tony Trabert of Cincinnati and Vic Seixas of Philadelphia trounced the No. 3 seeded Rosewall and Lew Hoad, also of Australia, 6-3, 7-5, 3-6, 4-7, 8-6.

In the women's semifinals, Louise Brough of Beverly Hills, Calif., beat Doris Hart of Coral Gables, Fla., 2-6, 6-3, 6-3. The California girl, three-time winner here, had been rated fourth and Miss Hart second.

Martinez' manager, Bill Daly, who is no man for penny ante measures, saw his 25-year-old puncher from Paterson hand Aragon the worst beating of his career Thursday night and announced:

"I am ready to guarantee Gavilan \$100,000 to defend his title here against Vince."

Vince handed the Los Angeles veteran a terrible beating to win a unanimous decision in 10 rounds of a brutal match.

Aragon's face was a bloody mess. He had slashes around both eyes which were almost shut tight, his nose was broken and his mouth was cut.

Stan Musial Tops All-Star Vote Getters

CHICAGO (AP)—Outfielder Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals regained the lead as the highest individual vote getter in the all-star baseball poll.

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Florists - All - Star Proceeds Tagged For Basin Youngsters

Youngsters of the Klamath Basin will be on the receiving end of all the net proceeds of the Erv Lind Florists-Klamath All-Star Women's softball game next Friday night at Conger Field.

The top-notch sporting event is being sponsored by the Klamath Falls 20-30 Club, and all of the money taken after the needed expenses are paid, will go into the club's different children's projects.

At this time the club handles the Christmas candy project, which consists of handing out candy canes at the annual Christmas parade, installing playground equipment at Conger Field and the annual Easter Egg hunt held at Moore Park every spring.

Reserved seats are now on sale at Underwood's Camera shop, Seventh and Main, and any of the 20-30 club members also have tickets.

To accommodate the expected crowd the city Recreation Department and the 20-30 club members have been moving extra seats to Conger Field, and close to 1,000 of these will be reserved. The price of admission is \$1.00 for reserved seats and 50 cents for general admission seats, that will go on sale the night of the game.

The Florists are the largest attraction that have ever played in Klamath Falls for either men or women's softball, and were talked into stopping over for the exhibition game on their way south on a tour.

The preliminary game which will start at 6:30 will pit the top two teams in the Men's Softball League in what could very well decide the league's championship, when Bill's Place and Suburban tangle.

Both teams are currently tied for the leagues lead with five wins and one loss, and a win for either team in the warm-up game to the Florists-All-Star contest could possibly mean the championship later this year.

sults from Williamson River, with garden hackle, or worms, as bait. Woble Rites and other spinning lures still are the best bet on the Wood River, but a few catches have been reported on night crawlers and medium colored single eggs.

Lake of the Woods was the cold spot last weekend, but catches were reported on Doc Sheltons.

Another possibility while fishing the Williamson or the Wood is the salmon fly. This fly produced very well for some anglers during the last few days and over last weekend's fishing.

Sprague River, both the north and south forks seem to be improving with the weather, with fly fishing taking over the top spot on the north fork, and single eggs and worms bring best results on the south arm of the river.

East and Paulina Lakes were somewhat of a fisherman's paradise the last couple of weekends for most anglers. The best fishing was reported at Paulina but East is getting better by the day, according to all the reports from the Bend area lakes.

For those who troll either of these twin lakes, just north of La pine on Highway 97, ford fenders and Flat Fish should bring on the

Douglas Leads Motor City Open

DETROIT (AP)—Dave Douglas took a 1-stroke lead Thursday with a 3-under-par 68 in the first round of the Motor City Open.

The 36-year-old slugger from Grossinger, N.Y., totted par 35-36-71 Meadowbrook Country Club layout in 33-35, bagging four birdies to offset a two stroke penalty on the 14th when his tee shot sailed out of bounds.

Cary Middlecoff, a pre-tournament favorite, finished with a 72 only one over par.

One stroke off Douglas' pace were three veterans—Chuck Kocis of Royal Oak, Mich., George Fazio of Pine Valley, N.J., and Johnny Palmer of Charlotte, N.C. Each had a 69.

Bob Inman of Tulsa, Okla., Bob Tozki of Livingston, N.J., and Doug Higgins of Midland, Tex., were the only others in the field of 187 to crack Meadowbrook's 71 par. Each shot a 70.

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
