

Chicago, Cleveland Meet For Important Games

Giants Increase NL Lead

The time has come for the New York Yankees to sit back and watch Cleveland and Chicago knock each other around long enough for the Yanks to slip into the American League lead.

It may not happen that way, but there never will be a better opportunity. Here's the situation in the league in the next 10 days.

Cleveland, now leading by three games, has to play the second-place White Sox eight times between tonight and a week from Sunday.

During the same spell the Yankees will be meeting fifth-place Washington in seven games. And right here may be the kicker. The Yanks should win most of all of those games, but there is no certainty that they will. So far, the Senators steadfastly have refused to play dead for the New Yorkers. In fact, they've won five of the nine games played so far.

Cleveland and Chicago have met eight times with the White Sox winning five. Even if they can keep up this average the Sox will gain only one full game on the Indians. They'll still trail Cleveland by two.

But the path would be open for the Yankees. If they could win their seven with Washington they'd shoot to the top, a game in front of Cleveland.

New York was the only one of the American League contenders that played yesterday. The Yanks jumped away to a 7-0 lead at Boston but had to struggle for an 8-7 victory. This left the Yanks 3 1/2 games out of first place.

In the National League, the New York Giants swept into a four-game lead by whipping Brooklyn for the third straight day 5-2. St. Louis crushed Milwaukee 9-2 with Stan Musial and rookie Joe Cunningham hitting two home runs each. No other games were scheduled in either league.

Johnny Sain, who has allowed only eight runs in 35 2-3 innings of relief pitching, came to the Yankees' rescue in Boston and shut out the stubborn Red Sox through the final three innings. Home runs by Mickey Mantle, Hank Bauer and Andy Carey were the big blows in the Yanks' 12-hit attack.

The Giants used another of their patented late-inning climaxes to hog-tie the Dodgers. After Brooklyn had pulled into a 2-2 deadlock in the seventh on home runs by Roy Campanella and Carl Furillo, the Giants came back with three in the eighth. The first two of the three came as pinch hitter Dusty Rhodes duplicated his game-winning single of Tuesday night with the bases loaded.

Cunningham, brought up to the Cardinals Wednesday as a replacement for Tom Alderson, hit one home run in his first major league game drove home four runs with his two blows into the right field seats at Milwaukee yesterday.

Harvey Haddix, the league's biggest winner, was struck on the leg by a line drive.

The Letters continued to hold the lead of the Women's Trio League after last night's action at Lucky Lanes, with the Screwwalls in the runner-up spot, one game behind.

Lewiston Shuts Out Senators 5-0

Edmonton, Lewiston and Victoria posted victories in rain-abbreviated Western International League baseball Thursday night.

Edmonton trimmed Tri-City 7-6 and 9-5 in a Dominion Day twin bill at Edmonton, Lewiston shut out Salem 5-0, and Victoria ousted Wenatchee 8-3. Rain washed out a scheduled doubleheader between league-leading Vancouver and number one Yakima.

Don Gigli and John McKeown paced Edmonton in the double victory over the Braves from Kennewick. Gigli hit a two-run homer in the opener and McKeown matched it in the nightcap. McKeown also hit a three-bagger and drove in four of the Eskimos' runs.

Len Tran knocked out a two-run round-tripper for Tri-City in the first game. Bob Williams' three-run homer in the third inning started Lewiston on its way to victory over Salem. Williams added another tally in the eighth, singling and crossing the plate on Ed Garay's double. Russ Rosburg's home run in the sixth accounted for the Braves' other run. Dean Kime limited Salem to four hits, two by Connie Perez.

Homers were a factor in Victoria's triumph over Wenatchee. Catcher Don Lundberg hit two and outfielder Tom Perez one. Hal Flinn spaced 10 Wenatchee hits, allowing three apiece to Joe Unfried and Tony Privava.

The win hoisted Victoria into sixth place and dropped Wenatchee into the Tyees' former berth, a game ahead of cellar-dwelling Salem.

Card Rookie Left Minors Minus Pants

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Joe Cunningham, young St. Louis Cardinals' first baseman who has hit three homers and driven in nine runs in two games as a major leaguer, is going to have to buy another pair of trousers.

"Man," the 22-year-old blond slugger said in the clubhouse here yesterday after cracking a pair off Warren Spahn, veteran Milwaukee Braves' left-hander, "this is just like a dream."

"I always wanted to be a big leaguer, but I had no idea it would come so soon. I left the minors in such a hurry I only brought along one pair of trousers. I guess I'm still in a sort of shock."

It was just two nights ago, after an International League doubleheader with Havana, Cuba, that Cunningham found out he was coming up to the Cardinals from their Rochester, N. Y., farm club.

"They told me that night, after we got through, that at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning I was to go up to the Cardinals," he said with a shy grin. "I had all my stuff at the cleaners and the only pants I've got are the ones I've been wearing."

Cunningham joined the Cardinals at Cincinnati Wednesday night three hours before game time after a bus and airplane trip and made a sensational debut, clouting a home run off Art Fowler and singling in five trips to the plate to drive in five runs.

Yesterday he faced Spahn, the National League's top southpaw a year ago, leading off the second inning. A left-handed hitter, Cunningham took one ball and then drove a 390-foot homer into the right field bleachers. He came up again in the third with Ray Jablonski and Rip Repulski on base and drove his second four-bagger into the bleachers just inside the foul marker, about 350 feet.

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Portland Stops Hollywood Twice

The jinx second division Portland holds over league leading Hollywood is making a race in the Pacific Coast League and the Stars are no longer considered a shoo-in for the flag.

Beavers continued their mastery over Hollywood Thursday night and won twice — 4-3 in 11 innings and then 10-5.

That narrowed Hollywood's first place margin to 2 1/2 games over the San Diego Padres and also boosted the Beavers out of the PCL cellar.

The Stars seem to have lost their touch with the home run, while Portland employed the long ball most effectively Thursday night.

The Beavers, who have won 9 of 10 games with the Stars, moved into seventh place and allowed Los Angeles to drop into the basement.

Pitcher Dick Fielder, who had collected only one previous hit during the season, came to bat in the 11th inning of the first game, and belted the game-winning home run. The score had been 3-3 since the sixth, Portland having collected a trio from Fletcher Robbe's homer in the fourth.

Robbe put the Beavers ahead with a two-run homer in the first inning of the nightcap as Portland jumped on Hollywood ace Mel Queen. Portland added five more in the third on three hits and three walks.

Manager Bobby Bragan was thumbed during the inning for protesting a called fourth ball and before the game was over the umpires had cleared half the Stars' bench.

San Diego, always regarded as a solid contender for the flag, smothered Los Angeles again, 8-4, hitting four home runs in the process.

San Francisco first baseman Jimmy Westlake hit a single with the bases jammed in the ninth to give the Seals a 5-4 decision over Sacramento. It was the third straight loss for the Seals.

Oakland was rained out at Seattle and the teams, which were to have played a doubleheader, will try it again Friday night.
