Double-Ring Ceremony Unites Sharon Strand To Gaylon Huff

Candlelight on yellow snapdragons and white delphinium in large basket arrangements was the background for the pretty wedding of Sharon Strand to Gaylon Huff in Klamath Lutheran Church, June 12.

The 8 p.m. double-ring ceremony, read by the Rev. Richard Graef, united the daughter of a well-known Klamath Falls family, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. (Dick) Strand, 1924 Logan Street, to the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Huff of Halfway, Oregon. The altar was banked with fern and a silk cord connected aisle pews which were lighted with tapers.

Sharon was given in marriage by her father, who escorted her down the aisle. Mrs. A. H. Denison, organist, played the processional. Mrs. Denison also accompanied Richard Melum who sang "The Wedding Prayer," and the "Lord's Prayer." She also played the recessional.

Sharon's gown was waltz-length of nylon lace and tulle over satin. The fitted bodice was styled with a vee-neck of the lace over satin ... and the matching sleeves were pointed at the wrists.

Her fingertip veil was caught by a cap of lace encrusted with seed pearls. She carried a white Bible topped with a single white orchid surrounded with stephanotis and tied with stephanotis florets knotted in satin ribbon.

Charlotte Baker, popular author of children's books, many of them with a Pacific Northwest locale, has a ready and waiting market for her stories; all built on solid foundations of historical facts accumulated over long periods of painstaking research.

As an author, she is frequently asked, "Where do you get your ideas?" The idea for her latest book, "The Venture of the Thunderbird," grew out of her work as a staff member of the Portland Art Museum.

The story takes place in the early days of the fur trade, when small American vessels sailed around the Horn to the wild northwest coast of America to make up a cargo for the China market.

The "Thunderbird" is one of these little seafaring vessels — and the book is a long, fully developed tale of action, suspense and excitement — a gripping novel for all lovers of sheer adventure, regardless of age.

We lent our copy of "The Venture of the Thunderbird" to a couple of young local readers and now are badgered with "When will The Return of the Thunderbird be out?" — answer to that question is "August" (we're waiting for it too!).
