## Proposed TL Budget Shown

TULELAKE — Tulelake's proposed city budget of \$88,350 for 1954-55 will be the largest in the history of the city, with the city income up in ratio.

Adoption of the suggested figure is to be made by the city council at the first July meeting.

The budget is an increase of \$12,100 over last year's figure, an amount approximating the sum recommended for retirement of city water bonds this year.

Increased city income is attributed in part to increased use of city water since good water was found a few months ago.

Biggest item in the proposed amount, \$36,200 is for maintenance and operation of the water department and the retirement of the bonds. The 1953 figure was \$20,000.

Of this year's sum, \$6,000 will go for expansion of the department to include water distribution to the new addition and to the fairgrounds area.

Cost of the police department has been budgeted at \$14,000 with other departments as follows: street department, \$11,500; garbage department, \$6,000; fire department, \$4,900; airport, \$2,800; library and recreation department, and the judicial \$1,000 each; ambulance service, mosquito control, printing and publications, \$500 each; city defense, \$100; salaries for city clerk and assistant clerk, \$1,500; city treasurer, \$500.

For emergencies the council indicated \$2,000 for redemption of bonds, other than those sold last year to cost \$3,650.

## Subs Given New Interiors

PEARL HARBOR — U. S. Navy submarines are going in these days for "free expression." The results in the interior of the submarines have been startling.

Mess compartments are decorated with murals of glacial lakes and cooling snow scenes. Decks have such colors as red tile and walls are pink.

There are sonal ash trays and individual bed lamps by each bunk, curtains and upholstered chairs.

It started a year ago when Mrs. Alec Baird was asked by crewmen of the Sabalo to help spruce up the interior of the ship. Said Mrs. Baird:

## Jets Complete Non-Stop Flight

MARCH AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. — Three Air Force B-47 bombers have returned from a record-breaking nonstop flight to Japan, covering the 6,700-mile distance in 15 hours.

The stratojets left here June 21 for Tokyo and required three refuelings in flight while making the longest nonstop jet flight in history.

JERUSALEM — Israel charged an Arab sniper killed an Israeli soldier early Friday on Mt. Zion, breaking a cease-fire ordered after more than 24 hours of intermittent shooting in the holy city. Israeli authorities said the casualty toll stood at 3 dead and 28 wounded as the shootings entered their third day.

## Pilot Helped Win Revolt

CHQUIMULA, Guatemala (P)—An affable young rebel pilot is credited with waging a one-man air war that helped blast Guatemalan President Jacobo Arbenz Guzman and his Communist friends out of power.

The airman whose identity is a closely guarded secret — played havoc with Arbenz's forces from a tiny Cessna single-engine plane whose designer never dreamed it would be used as a dive bomber.

The pilot opened his air campaign the day the rebel invasion began—June 18—by swooping low over Guatemala's port of San Jose. He riddled fuel tanks with machine gun bullets, sending up in flames much of Arbenz's fuel supply and forcing the government to put a quick ban on use of gasoline by private cars.

Later the young airman sneaked in over Guatemala City and blasted the army's main garrison of Matamoros.

A few days ago, he zoomed over a government troop train speeding reinforcements from the capital to the embattled city of Zacapa. He stopped the train with a few well-placed bombs then proceeded to strafe soldiers fleeing from the wrecked cars.

On some missions the pilot took along a bombardier. The latter leaned out of the window when the little plane passed over the target and tossed out a bomb.

Sometimes a 20-pound fragmentation bomb was used, but more often the missile consisted of several sticks of dynamite wrapped around a grenade. A string was tied to the grenade. As the parcel dropped earthward the bombardier jerked the cord, thus setting off the blast.
