Flooded City Given US Aid

EAGLE PASS, Tex. (AP) — Flood trucksloads of it, was flown across the Rio Grande today to flood-wracked Piedras Negras, Mexico, where at least 33 persons died in the river's roaring waters this week. Earlier, helicopters had lifted food and clothing into the town on an unofficial basis, simply because the people needed it. filled the new Falcon International Dam's great reservoir, Falcon Lake, to half capacity, a little more than 2,000,000 acre feet. Water was 114 feet deep at the dam and covered 69,000 acres at last report. Water had backed up 40 miles in the gigantic new lake. Typhoid inoculations continued along the river in both American and Mexican towns. Utilities gradually were being restored. About 1,000 persons still lived in shelter areas in Laredo because their homes were destroyed or damaged. On the Mexican side, hundreds still camped in the hills. The river continued to fall yesterday from a level of 11 feet where it had dropped from Thursday's record crest of 62.21 feet.

Fund Bills Signed By Ike

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower Friday signed three appropriation bills providing more than 2 1/2 billion dollars for a group of federal departments and agencies. The three measures, last of the regular annual appropriation bills, supply these operating funds for the fiscal year which started Thursday: 1. Legislative branch \$70,655,754; judicial branch \$27,501,740. 2. Labor Department and related agencies \$11,784,500; Welfare Department \$1,163,413,761. 3. State Department \$114,110,000; Justice Department \$178,864,500; Commerce Department \$837,022,000 and U.S. Information Agency \$77,114,000. The bills carry approximately 100 million dollars less than the President recommended last January.

Field Agents Move Quail

Over 1,000 of Oregon's quail were forcibly moved from their homes last year according to figures compiled in the annual report of the game division of the Oregon State Game Commission. As part of a program to increase the quail populations, field agents of the game commission have been engaged in trapping and transplanting the three species found here in Oregon. This type of management has generally been found superior to artificial propagation and actually aids the coveys where trapping is carried on. Since the quail tend to form tight coveys and not spread out on their own, the forced travel tends to scatter the flocks and thus make wider distribution. Much of the trapping was done in the southeastern part of the state where 437 of the transplants were taken. They were all released in other sections in the same general area. In northeastern Oregon, 200 valley and bobwhite quail were moved to new areas. Central Oregon agents moved 259 valley quail, while in the southwestern part of the state, 30 valley and 126 mountain quail took trips. A few of the birds were shipped to the commission's game farms where they will be held as brood stock for the artificial propagation of birds to establish them in areas where none are now present.

NOW, THEREFORE I, Paul L. Patterson, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of ORS 47.156 do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above described areas to be unlawful and that said areas shall be subject to entry only through permit to be issued by the forester or fire warden. Pursuant to ORS 47.158 the forester may during periods of fire hazard conditions, refuse, postpone or restrict issuance of such permits when necessary to prevent danger to life or property. The permit shall require the entrant:
(1) To refrain from smoking except in places designated as safe in said permit.
(2) To build no open fires except in places designated as safe in said permit.
(3) To have as equipment when traveling as a pedestrian or camping at improved, designated and posted campgrounds, tools specified by the forester as suitable for extinguishing fires.
This Proclamation shall be effective from and after the 2nd day of July, 1954, and shall remain in full force and effect until the 31st day of December, 1954.
