

Sandy Saddler KO's Libby Manzo

NEW YORK (AP)—Sandy Saddler, the leatherweight champ, still is five or six fights away from his pre-Army peak despite a knockout victory over game little Libby Manzo.

The champ showed only flashes of his old form in disposing of Manzo in 2:35 of the 10th round last night at St. Nicholas Arena but he didn't forget any of his rough-house tactics. Referee Al Berl warned Saddler repeatedly for wrestling and once for a borderline left hook.

"I thought he was improved on his last fight," said Charlie Johnston, Saddler's manager, "but he still isn't in shape. He hasn't got back his old sharpness. We're going to take our time."

Saddler was quick to admit his own shortcomings.

"I forgot a few things I knew before I went in the Army," he said. "My legs felt fine but the reflexes aren't up to par yet. Maybe I'll be ready by September. When I'm ready I'll take anybody, Percy Bassett or anybody they want if I can get a good payday."

Manzo was Saddler's 94th knockout victim in 148 pro fights. Although the 24-year-old was cut around both eyes and needed seven stitches in the flesh over the right eye, he gave the champ a good fight. He gave away reach and height. He outweighed saddler 134½ to 131½ pounds in the non-title bout.

Sandy tagged Manzo with a left hook and then dropped him with a right uppercut in the 10th. Manzo got up at seven and then collapsed in a neutral corner. Referee Al Berl ruled a knockout, not a TKO.

Bill McNece, a rough brawler

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from Central Islip, N.Y., earned an Aug. 23 Eastern Parkway date with Bobby Dyles by stopping Jackie La Bua of New York on a TKO at the end of six rounds last night at the Parkway.

Referee Pete Scalzo said he stopped the fight because La Bua looked tired and open for more punishment after being rocked with two solid right-hand punches in the sixth. La Bua was cut over the left eye.

McNece weighed 163½, La Bua, 162½.

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San Diego Moves Closer To Stars

Lefty O'Doul's San Diego Padres have edged to within a half game of Hollywood in the Pacific Coast League flag race.

Less than three weeks ago the Stars had a seven game bulge and their ace pitcher, Mel Queen, was riding along on the crest of an 11-game streak. Mel hasn't entered the winner's circle since May 30. Bob Hall, who was the loser in a 20-inning game with Al Gettel of Oakland, was sold to Seattle, and the only sure fire pitcher manager Bobby Bragan has at the moment is Lino Donoso, the cunning Cuban.

Seattle took the opener of a doubleheader from Hollywood Monday, 7-5, with Queen accepting for another loss, and it took Donoso's relief hurling in the second game to salvage a 6-4 decision. The Stars outlit Seattle in both games, ran the bases with abandon, hit three homers in the first game and one in the second, but had to bear down hard to get an even break. Tom Saffell swiped three bases, Carlos Bernier four, bringing their totals to 28 and 27, respectively.

San Diego took a doubleheader from San Francisco, 5-3 in 11 innings and 4-2 in eight.

Portland and Oakland split their twin bill, the Oaks taking the first, 5-3, and Dick Waibel pitching a four-hit masterpiece in the second for a 1-0 Portland triumph. Sam Chapman homered with one on in the first game and lefty Don Ferrarese scored his 12th win although he needed help from Harry Nichols in the eighth. Waibel's victory was scored at the expense of the veteran, Gettel. The game's only run came in the second inning when Rocco Krsulich doubled and came in when the Oaks failed to convert Waibel's infield roller into a double play.

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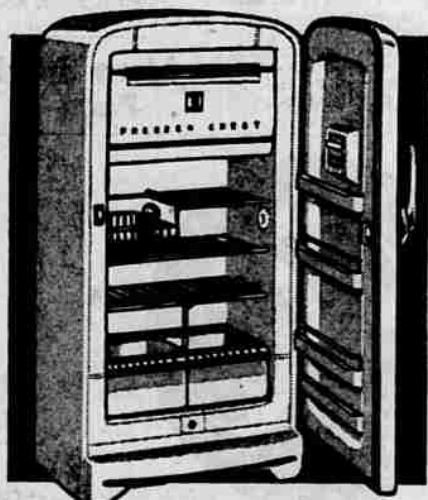


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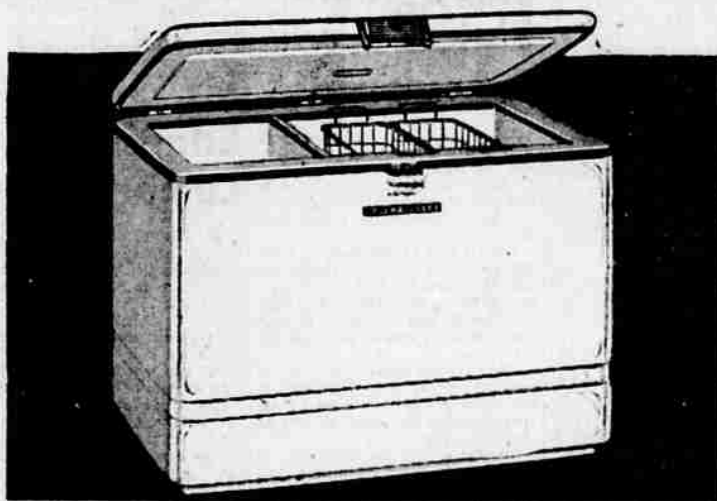
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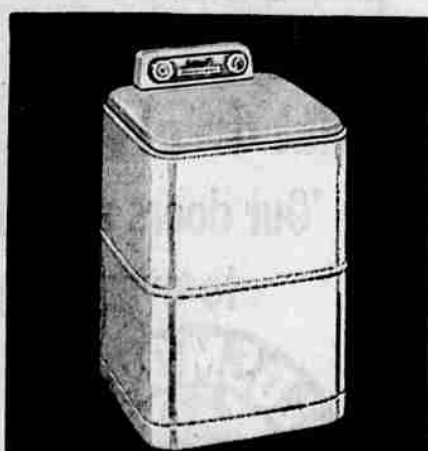
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
