## French, Reds Hold Meetings

**HANOI, Indochina (AP)—**French Union and Vietnam military representatives were scheduled to hold the third session at Trung Gia village today to continue mapping details of a possible Indochina cease-fire.

(The New York Times in a dispatch from Hanoi said the two sides had agreed yesterday on a procedure for exchange of sick and wounded prisoners of war. The dispatch said the first POW swap would be made on July 14, Bastille Day and France's national holiday.)

The delegates met for the first time in the "peace" village of thatched huts Sunday. The area, declared a neutral zone, is about 25 miles north of Hanoi in territory controlled by the Communist-led insurgents.

The talks were understood to be concerned mainly with regrouping of troops on both sides in case a truce is agreed on in Geneva to halt the 8-year-old war. The delegation's recommendations will be referred to the higher level Indochina talks now going on in Switzerland.

Yesterday the military representatives met for over two hours in closed session. Then the chief delegates—Col. Marcel Lennuyoux for the French and Gen. Van Thien Dung for the Vietnam—talked privately.

In Saigon, Vietnamese Premier Ngo Dinh Diem formed a new cabinet in an effort to rally more popular support behind chief of state Bao Dai. The Premier took over the defense and interior ministries himself. Other Cabinet members, averaging only 40 years in age, are Vietnamese who have shown an independent attitude toward the French.



## Legal Notice

**PROCLAMATION**

WHEREAS, the unregulated use of certain forest areas is, in the judgment of the State Forester, a menace to life and property due to conditions tending to cause or affect the rapid spread of fires which might occur or because of the inaccessible character of such areas due to the lack of suitable roads, and

WHEREAS, upon the showing of the State Forester it appears to me to be necessary to close to unregulated use the following areas designated as:

**AREA NO. R-1** — All of the following National Forests in Oregon and adjacent areas protected by the United States Forest Service, as follows:

Adjacent to Rogue River National Forest:  
 Sections 1, 12 and 25, T. 32 S., R. 2 E.; that part of T. 32 S., R. 3 E. WEST OF Mill Creek and north of Schoolmarin Creek; Sections 20 and 21, T. 39 S., R. 1 E.; Section 26, T. 40 S., R. 5 W.; and T. 41 S., Rs. 2 and 4 W.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, I, Paul L. Patterson, Governor of the State of Oregon, by virtue of the authority vested in me under the provisions of Section 477.158, Oregon Forest Laws, 1954, do hereby proclaim the unregulated use of the above-described areas to be unlawful and do hereby close said areas and the same shall be subject to use only upon condition that entrants shall comply with all of the following requirements or conditions:

- (1) To refrain from smoking while traveling in such areas.
- (2) To secure a permit issued by the forester or a fire warden before building a campfire other than at improved, designated and posted campgrounds on such areas.
- (3) To have as a part of his or her equipment when using campfires, except when traveling as a pedestrian and/or camping at im-

proved, designated and posted campgrounds, tools, as specified by the forester suitable for extinguishing fires.

This proclamation shall be effective from and after the 30th day of June, 1954, and shall remain in full force and effect until and including the 31st day of December, 1954.

## Japanese Air Force Started

**CAMP MATUSHIMA, Japan (AP)—**Former Japanese air aces—in uniform again — stood shoulder to shoulder today with American fliers who will teach them to fly jets.

About 100 Japanese airmen stood at attention with U.S. Air Force men at ceremonies opening a new Japanese air force flight school here.

Daylight poured through hundreds of bullet holes in the big old imperial navy hangar, riddled by strafing U.S. Navy planes a decade ago.

Japan's new 6,000-man air force, which came into existence only last Thursday, is equipped with 60 light trainers and helicopters. But the Japanese expect the United States to supply Sabre jets and other modern planes later this year.

The first flight class of 16 former imperial captains, majors and lieutenant colonels includes some of Japan's leading Zero aces of World War II.

Among them are Kanishi Kishikawa, credited with 13 American planes, and Shigehisa Yamamoto, who claims 15 U.S. kills.

The graduates will become instructors for the Japanese air force, which the United States hopes will be strong enough to guard this island nation from invasion.

## Nation Enjoys Fair Weather

Fair and pleasant weather was the outlook for most of the country Tuesday although it was hot in some areas.

Skies generally were clear during the early morning. Showers and thunderstorms hit areas in the central part of the country and wide sections in the eastern half Monday and Monday night.

Temperatures were above seasonal levels in the mid-continent with readings around 100 degrees Monday in the central and southern plains and eastward into Mississippi and Arkansas to western Tennessee. There also were 100-degree readings in parts of northern Wyoming and southeastern Montana and in the southwest desert region.

One of the nation's hottest spots Monday was Miles City, Mont., with 108, while it was 104 in Memphis. It was generally cooler over the southern Great Lakes region, and west of the continental divide the northern New England states from northwestern Colorado to northern Idaho.
