

NY Giants Whip Bums Again

Homers Ruin Dodgers

One series after another league manager will tell you, does not make a season, so why get so excited about the current set between the New York Giants and the Brooklyn Dodgers?

But going into tonight's second game of the three-game series, the Giants were 4½ games in front of the Dodgers and if they go on to sweep the series, Walter Alton and his team will be up against a mighty tough problem in their quest for a third straight pennant.

Consider the Brooks' plight:

1. The pitching has been wobbly and, worse, only Bob Milliken among the relievers has been effective.
2. Their pinch hitters have been futile. In last night's 5½ setback by the Giants, they loaded the bases with none out in the ninth only to have George Shuba and Tube Walker, two pinch hitters, go down ignominiously.
3. They can't seem to shake the injury jinx. Pee Wee Reese, Duke Snider, Roy Campanella and Jackie Robinson among the first-liners have been having miseries.

The Giants, on the other hand, are sitting pretty. They have confidence, they've had fantastic good fortune with pinch hitters. When they're behind, they don't worry. With relief pitchers like Hoyt Wilhelm and Marv Grissom, who took over for Sal Maglie against the Brooks last night in the ninth with none out and three men on base and got away unscathed, they have two firemen they can trust.

Al Dark, Willie Mays and Monte Irvin hit home runs last night, accounting for four of the Giants' runs. Starter Preacher Roe was the victim of two and Bob Milliken, one. Maglie weathered a two-run first inning, then settled down until he ran into trouble again in the ninth and required the services of Grissom to pull it out.

Two other National League games produced shutouts. Gerry Staley blanked the Cincinnati Redlegs for the St. Louis Cardinals 6-0, and Curt Simmons of the Philadelphia Phillies whitewashed the Pittsburgh Pirates 3-0. In the other National League encounter, the Milwaukee Braves bombed the Chicago Cubs 14-3.

The Cleveland Indians held their 3½-game lead over the New York Yankees in the American League. The Tribe plastered the Baltimore Orioles 11-3 and the Yanks turned back the Boston Red Sox 4-1.

Virgil Trucks, the veteran right-hander of the Chicago White Sox, pitched his second one-hitter of the season as his injury-riddled mates whipped the Detroit Tigers 4-0. Johnny Sneed of the Washington Senators also was stingy with the bases hit, allowing the Philadelphia A's only half a dozen as the Nats hung a 5-2 defeat on Eddie Joost's men.

Staley was tapped for nine hits by the Redlegs, but kept them well-scattered. The Cards made only seven, but they were aided by three Cincinnati errors.

Simmons, who has had indifferent success during the first half of the season, was hit hard, but had good support to win No. 8 against six losses.

The in-and-out Braves scored 11 runs in the first three innings in handing the Cubs their fourth straight licking. Gene Conley had no trouble coasting to his seventh straight victory.

The Indians scored all 11 of their runs against the Orioles in the first inning to make Early Wynn's task easy.

Frank Sullivan, the 6-foot-7 Red Sox rookie right-hander, hurled creditably until the eighth when the Yanks scored twice. Their first two runs were the result of homers by Joe Collins and Andy Carey. Whitey Ford got the triumph.

Trucks' one-hitter was his 11th victory, but his club is six games off the pace and with its rash of injuries — 19 members of the team have been forced from the lineup this season — is beginning to show the wear and tear of the grind.

Only Harvey Kuenn's single in the third inning kept Trucks from recording the third no-hitter of his career.

Eddie Yost and Mickey Vernon each got three hits in Washington's assault on the assorted offerings of Bob Trice and Al Bina.

Snider - Mays Debate Tops Baseball Talk

NEW YORK — (NEA) — A baseball debate is on in New York, and for the first time in memory the Yankees aren't in on it — an exceedingly healthy sign for the National League.

The argument has to do with who is the superior center fielder, Duke Snider of the Dodgers or the Giants' Willie Mays.

On the strength of his phenomenal early foot, power and speed, Mickey Mantle was supposed to make the old-timers forget many a renowned name. The World Champions' Oklahoma Kid was ballhooped like a Ringling Bros. and Barnum and Bailey specialty, but perhaps due to injuries has never quite lived up to his notices.

Despite the fact that he has come on of late, Mantle at this time is the third best center fielder in the big town.

While there is an unusually fine lot of center fielders in the majors, Snider and Mays eclipse them all. Gus Bell of the Reds hardly can field with the top men. Jim Busby of the Senators and the Phillies' Richie Ashburn cannot match the front runners in long-ball hitting. Larry Doby of the Indians is inconceivable. Jim Piersall of the Red Sox does not hit enough. Wally Moon of the Cardinals still has to prove himself. Bill Britton of the Braves can't steal first base.

Snider is still the big center-fielder — has been for six campaigns — but the Polo Grounder wouldn't trade Mays even up for the Compton Clouter, not the least reason being that the Say Hey Kid is five years his junior.

Snider is the more polished all-around performer, figures to hit for the higher average, but the Alabama Special is making long strides along that line this season. Snider has the decided advantage of being the only left-hand batter in an order loaded with right-hand distance hitters. For this reason,

the Duke rarely has to face a left-hand pitcher who might bother him.

Being a left-hand batter, Snider bunts and drags the ball for hits. If it is possible for a player to cover center field more thoroughly than Snider, Mays does it.

An outstanding arm hangs from Snider's shoulder, but at the Polo Grounds, Mays roams 100 feet deeper than the Duke can at Ebbets Field. Mays therefore has more opportunities to show off an arm that throws strikes to the plate on the fly.

Snider is an excellent baserunner of fine speed. Mays is a superlative baserunner of greater speed. Mays is the inspirational force of the Giants. With all of Snider's ability, Jackie Robinson, Pee Wee Reese and Roy Campanella must be rated ahead of him as big players with the Dodgers.

No play or situation is impossible to Mays, the instinctive player. Willie never thinks that it can't be done. He gives it a try and sees if it can be done.

As illuminating as a Broadway sign with his cap flying off and other individual characteristics, Mays sell more tickets than Snider.

Duke Snider and Willie Mays are fully worthy of the daily check on their brilliant records.

Nothing could be more flattering.

NL Stars Go After Fifth Win

CINCINNATI (AP) — The National League all-stars go after their fifth straight victory next week at Cleveland with one of the best all-around crews in the history of the classic.

"I think this is the strongest squad the National League has ever had," said league president Warren Giles Wednesday. "I think we'll make it five straight."

Walter Alton of the Brooklyn Dodgers, manager of the Nationals, and Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees, pilot of the American all-stars, announced their pitching selections Tuesday and rounded out their roster with additions to all positions.

The starting berths, except for the pitching assignments, were selected by the national pastime's fans in a nationwide poll.

Alton, the first freshman manager to handle an all-star squad, named four righthanded hurlers and three lefties with a combined 67-36 won-loss record for the July 13 game.

The National League bullpen will be crowded with stars Robin Roberts of Philadelphia, Carl Erskine of Brooklyn, Gene Conley of Milwaukee, Marvin Grissom of New York, all righties, and Warren Spahn of Milwaukee, Harvey Haddix of St. Louis and Johnny Antonelli of New York, the southpaws. Antonelli has the best record, 12-3.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Joey Giardello risks his almost-certain mid-deweight title shot in a 10-round scrap at the arena here tonight with "upsetter" Billy Kilgore of Miami, Fla.

CBS will televise the fight starting at 9 p.m. EST.

Giardello, third-ranking 160-pound contender, tentatively has been promised a full crack at champion Carl (Bobo) Olson if the latter successfully defends his crown in his coming bout with Rocky Castellani. The Olson-Giardello bout would be Oct. 22.

But Giardello has to lick Kilgore and do it impressively. This Kilgore bout is another in the series of "forget Langlois" fights for the Philadelphia middleweight. Pierre Langlois recently took some of the shine off Joey with a good lacing

Since the Frenchman wouldn't go for a return bout, Giardello has been attempting to regain lost prestige against other available opposition. He declinated Honest Bobby Jones several weeks ago. He'll be a heavy favorite against Kilgore.

Giardello has won 50 fights and lost 11 with 5 draws.

A boxer with a not too punishing jab through most of his career, Giardello recently developed a new style that has earned him a reputation as a hard puncher.

Kilgore has a 27-15-4 record with recent wins over the faded Jake LaMotta, Jimmy Herring and Ernie Durando.
