Withdrawal Of French Army Deployed By Indo Premier

SAIGON, Indochina (AP) — Viet Nam Premier Ngo Dinh Diem said today he would demand it be returned to his government's control. There was no likelihood the French would or could meet Diem's demand for reoccupation of the 2,000 square miles of the southern delta, from which French Un-

ion forces withdrew last week. The French said the withdrawal was necessary to strengthen the defenses of Hanoi, Halphong and the highway and railway linking them. The Communist-led Vietminh moved into the abandoned area, populated by some two million people, as soon as the French moved out. But Diem's statement, made in an address on his inauguration today as Viet Nam premier, underlined his opposition to the partition of his country which most Vietnamese fear is now being worked out at the Geneva conference.

Though 300,000 Vietnamese are under arms, he went on, they do not constitute a real national army. Instead, he said, the French-controlled Vietnamese Troops feel themselves no more than a supplement to a friendly but foreign army. On the North Viet Nam war front, meanwhile, the French high command announced that 150 French bombers and fighters attacked Vietminh concentrations in the abandoned southern sector of the delta yesterday and that a "number" of trucks were destroyed. The Hanoi command announced also that its troops killed 40 Vietminh soldiers in a mop-up action between Viet Tri and Vinh Yen, 20 miles northwest of Hanoi. French losses were not disclosed.
