

Local All-Stars To Meet Erv Lind Florists Tonight

Men's Leaders In Prelim

The greatest softball or baseball attraction to appear in Klamath Falls for quite a few years will take place tonight at Conger Field as the world champion Erv Lind Florists of Portland meet an all-star delegation from the local girls' softball league, starting at 8:00.

The game is being sponsored by the 20-30 Club, and all of the net proceeds will go into the club's children's fund, such as the Christmas candy fund, the annual Easter egg hunt, held at Moore Park, and the buying of playground equipment.

The local all-star coaches, Ray Arnold and Bob Mathis have just about settled on their starting lineup for tonight's game, which will be the third game for the picked ball team.

Mickey Hayman, the league's leading pitcher will take the mound against the Florists and Teddy Walker will be in the catchers position at game time.

The all-star's infield will probably be made up of Ruth Hagelstein at first base and Sherry Larson will undoubtedly get the call for the third base spot. The key-stone combination will be made up of two Eagle Point girls, Silvia Bishop at second base and Bernice Bigham at shortstop.

In the outfield the all-stars will have Pat Barron in left field, Darlene Gordon in center and Sandy Barron in the right field position.

Several others will also see action against the traveling softballers from Portland, who have won the world championship twice, in 1944 and 1953, and have been in the national play-offs several other years.

Hagelstein and Walker will lead the local girls' team into tonight's game, that should please every softball fan in the Basin.

The heavy hitting first baseman of the local team, Hagelstein, is a two-time all-state softball player. In 1952 she was selected to the all-state outfield and last year was named as the all-state first baseman.

Walker, who made the trip to the state tournament with the Klamath County representatives last year, is another all-star that the local team can boast. The club's outstanding backstop was selected as the all-state catcher for 1953, following her tremendous showing in last year's state tournament at Portland.

Most of the girls that are on the all-star team are the same ones that made up the Basin's entry in the state tournament last year, that placed second.

Only the addition of four Eagle Point players, who are also in this league and Hayman are the major changes. Hayman is new to the Klamath Basin, but has played several years of softball in Montana, before coming to Klamath.

The probable starting lineup for the invading Florists will be either Lois Williams or Bev Wadsworth at the catching position and the famed Betty Evans Grayson will open on the mound against the local all-stars.

Williams is a six-time all-American, Grayson has been selected seven times and Wadsworth has been named to the national all-American team once.

The Florists' infield is loaded with three more all-Americans in Robbie Mulkey at first base, Margaret Dobson at third and Snookie Doyle at short or second. All three have been selected nationally five different seasons to the national team.

The remaining infield position will probably be filled by the hard hitting infielder Carolyn Filwater either at short or second.

Four Florists including two more all-Americans will fill the outfield positions for the Florists, Elizabeth Locke and Thelma Parrish Carlson, both two time selections, and either Carolyn Spady or Delores Price will get the starting calls.

Besides the starters, manager Erv Lind may also use Pearl Hendrie, another pitcher and Sue Hendrie, an infielder.

The preliminary game between Suburban and Bill's Place, two of the top teams in the local Men's League will start at 6:30. This is a non-league game, but will pit the two strongest clubs of the league into an opener for the outstanding softball program.

Don Mueller of the New York Giants is the son of Walter Mueller who played outfield for the Pittsburgh Pirates from 1922 to 1926.

Dressen Blames Pitching

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Chuck Dressen, who is having some pitching staff trouble of his own, thinks that maybe pitching is at the bottom of Brooklyn's troubles in the National League pennant race.

"You can't always tell from the box scores what the trouble is," said the former Dodger manager, explaining that he didn't want to try to analyze Brooklyn's come-down from this great distance.

He added, however, that he had noted "even Don Newcombe hasn't been able to win consistently. He won 20 games for me in 1951. And Joe Black, Russ Meyer and Carl Erskine aren't having good seasons."

The Giants took advantage of this to turn the tables on the Dodgers, said Dressen, who quit as the Dodger manager last year to become manager of Oakland in the Coast League.

"Last year we (meaning Brooklyn) beat the Giants 15 times—and 10 of those were in a row," Dressen recalled. "This year Brooklyn already has lost more games to the Giants than all of last year."

Dressen finds himself in about the same position as Brooklyn. His Oakland team is lagging about five games behind the Coast leaders. Several of his pitchers have not come through as expected.

NY Giants Give Jansen His Release

NEW YORK (AP)—Larry Jansen, onetime star pitcher who helped the Giants win the 1951 pennant, received his unconditional release as a player today. He was immediately signed by the Giants as a pitching coach at the same salary, believed close to \$25,000.

To replace the 34-year-old right-hander, the Giants brought up Al Corvin, another right-hander, from their Minneapolis farm club of the American Assn. Corvin has a 6-4 record with the Millers.

The Giants were reluctant to release Jansen, remembering the great deeds the soft-spoken, mild-mannered Oregonian had performed for them over a seven-year span. But a bad back made him of little use this season.

Jansen won two and lost two but he failed to complete any of his seven starts this year. He appeared in 12 games and allowed 57 hits in 41 innings.

Commissioner Meetings Draw To Close

COLORADO SPRINGS (AP)—The National Assn. of Collegiate Commissioners will conclude a seven-day meeting Friday with the announcement of NCAA basketball playoff sites and tournament dates.

Election of officers and selection of a meeting place for 1955 also was scheduled.

Walt Byers, NCAA executive director, said the commissioners hoped to adopt the same pattern of playoff policy for basketball as is followed currently in basketball.

Instead of three baseball teams battling for the right to represent one of the eight districts, only two teams would meet, sending eight teams in the playoffs.

The commissioners recommended Thursday that all-star high school baseball games be controlled in areas where they are not supervised by the National High School Federation. The large number of such games in some states reduces their significance, Kenneth L. (Tug) Wilson, Big Ten commissioner, declared.

He still has a keen eye for a curving baseball, and he proved it once again Thursday night as the Stars beat Seattle 8-4 in a Pacific Coast League baseball game.

Seattle was leading the Stars, 2-1, in the seventh, Dale Long was on third and Tommy Saffell on second. Manager Bob Bragan, who

was scheduled to bat, motioned to Kelleher. Frank swung two bats around for a full minute, stepped into the box, worked the count to 3 and 2, and then socked the next pitch over the left field wall.

Bragan's strategy paid off. Just before the gopher pitch, the Seattle battery, Al Evans and Ray Ortel, conferred on the mound on what to throw to Kelleher. Frank must have overheard them.

The Hollywood victory kept the stars in first place in the standings, and San Diego remained a half game behind in Oakland's San Francisco, 2-0.

Portland manhandled Oakland's classy left-hander, Artie Schallack, and beat the Aorns, 12-1. Red Adams gave Charley Dessen's club only seven hits.

Schallack gave way in the third inning but Portland continued its attack with a five-run fifth inning. But for all those scores the Ports got only 11 hits, one of them a homer by Fletcher Robbe with one on.

Seattle pitcher Gene Bearden was spiked in the leg in the first inning of the game at Hollywood and several stitches had to be taken to close the wound. Bearden covered home on a steal as Hollywood outfielder Carlos Bernier streaked for a home run with one on.
