Guatemalan Rebel Leader Named New Chief Of State

GUATEMALA (AP)—Col. Carlos Castillo Armas finally stood at the top of the political heap in Guatemala today. The government announced the rebel chief was elected president of a new three-man junta, the fifth government turnover in less than two weeks.

Col. Eliego Monzon, temporary chief of the five-man junta in charge since last Friday, remained on the new pared-down ruling body.

But the reins were clearly in Castillo's hands. The third member of the top group, Maj. Enrique Oliva, was defense minister in the provisional government which the rebel leader set up at Chiquimula after his army of Guatemalan exiles invaded their homeland from neighboring Honduras June 18.

A government decree last night said Castillo's election was effective immediately. The announcement said the five members of the previous junta voted unanimously to make him head man at the meeting Wednesday night.

The other two members of the previous group—Lt. Col. Mauricio Dubois and Lt. Col. Jose Luis Cruz—resigned. In a formal statement they said a smaller group would make governing easier. It

U.S. Airmen Aid French

SAIGON, Indochina (AP)—Premier Pierre Mendes-France's July 20 deadline for bringing peace to Indochina is holding up replacement of 265 U. S. Air Force technicians here, American sources said Friday.

The technicians who have been servicing and overhauling American-supplied B26 bombers and C47 transport planes are expected to be withdrawn from Tourane Air Base in central Viet Nam by the end of this month.

Only 124 of the original group which was rushed here from Japan and the Philippines in February now remain. Units based in Hai Phong and Do Son in northern Viet Nam have been moved to Tourane and are being phased out in small groups. Another group of about 50 technicians who were brought to Indochina without fanfare or publicity last year to service Flying Boxcar transports will remain.

Negotiations have been going on here and in Washington for the past two months among the French, U. S. aid officials and an American firm for hiring American civilians. The company involved is Aviation International Ltd. which is doing a similar job for the Indonesian government and has had experience in Burma, China and India.
