Cordon Explains Stand On Federal School Funds Bill

WASHINGTON—On two occasions—in the only years in which the issue has been directly before the Senate in the past decade—Senator Guy Cordon of Oregon flatly opposed efforts to prohibit the use of federal funds for assistance to private, sectarian schools.

Oregon's senior senator cited his two votes in a letter to F. Leo Smith, Portland attorney and lobbyist, who had asked the senator to clarify his position with respect to federal aid to parochial schools in an aid program should approve an aid program for public schools.

Smith, a former member of the Oregon legislature and an avowed supporter of State Senator Richard L. Neuberger, who is the Democratic candidate opposing Senator

Cordon for election in November, sought to raise the religious error in a letter to Cordon concerning on a speech by State Senator Phillip G. Hitchcock a Cordon supporter.

The senior Oregon senator has been reluctant to engage in a religious controversy in the heat of a political campaign feeling it has no place there. But efforts in some circles to distort his voting record on federal aid to education into an indication of anti-Catholicism persuaded him to reply to Smith's direct request for information.

Senator Cordon pointed out that in 1948 when a federal aid to education bill was before the Senate former Senator Forrest C. Donnell (D. Mo.) had offered an amendment which would have constituted a flat iron ban on use of federal funds for any type of assistance to parochial schools.

Senator Cordon voted against the amendment which was defeated on a roll-call vote.

The following year a federal aid to education bill again reached the Senate and Senator Donnell offered a similar amendment prohibiting use of federal funds to assist parochial schools. Senator Cordon again opposed the amendment which was defeated for the second time.

The Oregon senator in further reply to Smith conceded that in collection with the 1948 bill, he had voted against an amendment offered by the late Senator Brian McMahon (D. Conn.) which would have made mandatory allocation of federal funds to parochial schools for assistance in transportation book and health services.

But he pointed out that this amendment however worthy it may have been was so drawn that "it was an invasion of states

rights and contrary to the constitutional provisions of nearly half the states."

Taking cognizance of the fact there has been criticism of him for having voted in 1952 against the Hill amendment to the Tide-

lands bill—and amendment which attempted to earmark the proceeds of oil leases for federal assistance to education—Senator Cordon agreed he had done so. But he explained the Hill amendment regardless of its in-

tent made no provision for distribution of such funds as might accrue from oil leases and had in itself no relationship to the question of federal assistance to parochial schools.

Because the entire method of distribution together with questions of eligibility for various types of assistance was not defined in the Hill amendment but left instead to some future Congress I opposed it Senator Cordon wrote Smith.

Eggs Hurlled By Union Pickets

RED BLUFF, Calif. (AP)—Eggs were hurled at lumber workers who crossed strike picket lines at the Red Bluff molding mill Thursday.

Les O. Cody, co-owner of the mill, said pickets threw the eggs. He said workers' cars were "liberally splattered with eggs" but no one was injured.

The mill is one of several affected by a 19-day old strike of AFL unionists.

Cody said he is operating only seven shy of the plant's normal staff; that 60 workers have crossed the lines and resumed their jobs.
