## Johnny Hitson Replaces Crawley In Point Lead

Hardtop racing fans are in for another treat tomorrow night at Gem Speedway if the performances of the drivers and cars continue as they have done in the past few races.

There seems to be no stopping the local and California drivers so far this season, and the racing in the over-all picture is greatly improved over last season.

Johnny Hitson, in K-7, took over the point lead from Bob Crawley who has led in points through the entire early season performances.

Hitson enlarged his total to 216 points over the two-day racing weekend last Sunday and Monday, while Crawley also added a few points, but not enough to keep the lead. His total now stands at 206.

The other top drivers include Benny Morrison with 172, Rusty Phillips 168, Matt Christian 158, Wes Owens 156, Al Rossi 147, Jerry Johnson 142, Russ Newell 138 and Neil Mayfield, who had compiled 127 points.

In last Monday night's program two of the leading drivers, Hitson and Rossi demonstrated some top notch driving to the hardtop fans.

Hitson got in a tangle with Wes Owens that required a tow truck to separate the two cars. But Hitson, with the hardtop door almost broken off, went from last place in the A-main to third place in the final nine laps.

Rossi, on the other hand, went from the very tail end of the B-main event cars to finish fourth in the short time of two laps.

Another driver who made the fans sit up and take notice is Rusty Phillips, in C-2. The Yreka driver was the first hardtop driver to win two A-mains this season, and then came back the following week to win this third straight before bowing out of the winner's circle to George Smith last Monday night.

Time trials start at 6:30 tomorrow night, and the first event of the racing program will get underway around 7:15. There will be four heat races, the trophy dash, final heat, C-race, B-main and the A-main, with a possible pit man's race for a special.

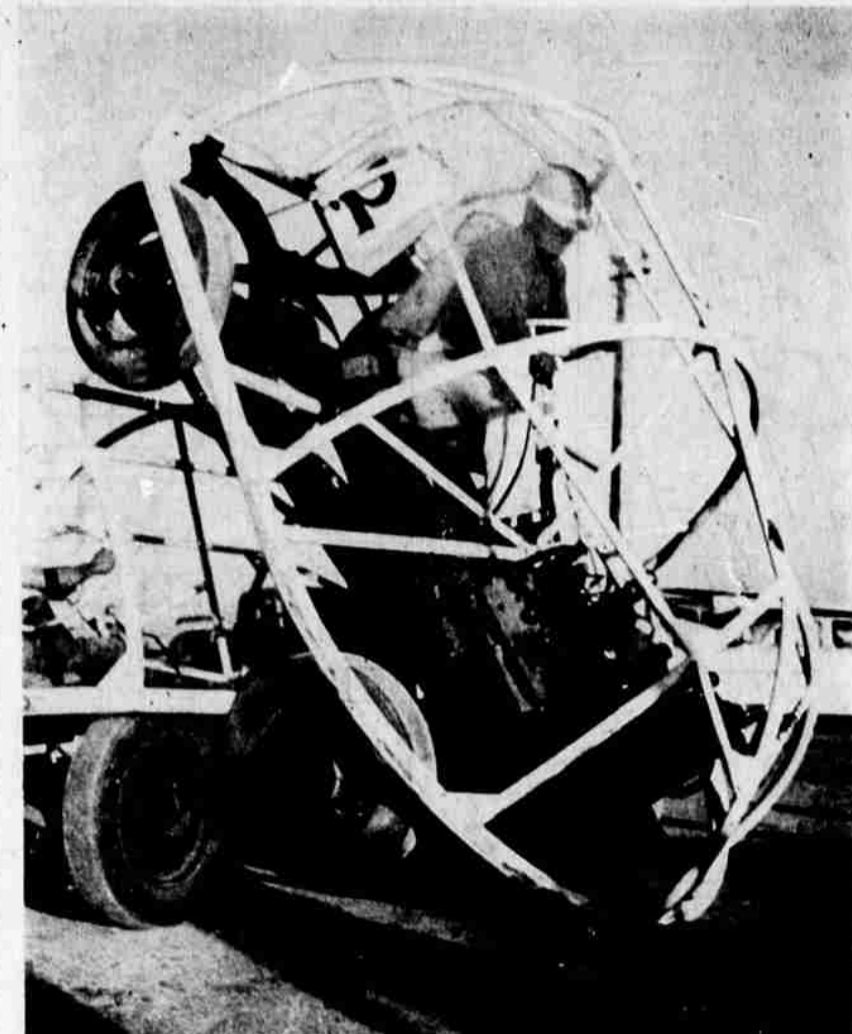

**NEW YORK** (AP) — A local television station reports that 10 million persons, more than there are in some states we could name, watched the recent 13-inning night-game thriller between the New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers.

Even though they must have done some fast counting, we are not disposed to argue about the figure. There are a great many set owners within a 50-mile radius of this city, and we have not run into one yet who was not tuned into the contest in question. Judging by the noise, there must have been nearly a million of them in our block alone.

Since that eventful night we have done considerable thinking and have listened to a great many snatches of conversation having to do with the one game which kept a city awake, in particular, and the Giants and Dodgers in general. The result is a slight revision of opinion.

Television, we now realize, is not an untried evil so far as the future of baseball is concerned, as some magnates contend. It might be, on the other hand, the medium which will attract many thousands of new fans to a game which has shown signs of losing out to the automobile, the race track and the corner ice cream den.

None of the 10 million, give or take a few dozen, who witnessed the well ballyhooed Giants-Dodgers game on home screens could have wedged his way into the Polo Grounds if he wanted to. The place was full. But there will be other times when he can get in, and from what we have seen and heard lately there are a great many new customers around this town.

Having watched a thrilling game on TV and apparently for the first time caught the flavor of the sport, these potential attendance figures now want to get out and see what a ball park looks like and count the men on the field for themselves. Couple of them bobbed up in my own living room and have been yammering for passes ever since.

Nothing is too rough for these cars and their drivers, and fans, who have seen this action packed sport before, have witnessed head on crashes, startling pile ups and some fancy driving on the parts of these experienced drivers.

A high rubber ball that stands close to seven feet high and weighs in the neighborhood of 200 pounds is the object of the chase after the starters whistle gives the signal.

By hitting, pushing or riding the ball, the drivers attempt to maneuver it through goals that are established at each end of the track.

The sport was originated in Southern California and has swept the nation by the thrill-a-minute action that has been seen by the thousand of sport fans who have been able to watch this polo on wheels played.
