It Happened This Way in New Pine Creek

Last Wednesday, June 30, when the new fiscal year began, it was with considerable sadness that Lee Dees, local star route carrier, dismissed the old fiscal year. There was pathos coupled with a tone of finality in his voice when he said as we shook hands, "It's been a pleasure working with you folks for the past eight years—don't know when I'll see you again—so good-bye and good luck."

"Same to you, Lee—we'll be missin' you," I managed. "By the way—what are you going to do?" "Don't know," he said. "I'll take a trip up into the Northwest—into Canada and back along the Pacific Coast. Then I don't know what I will do. Probably bid in another job carrying mail somewhere. That's about all I know how to do or can do now."

And this is quite understandable. Lee said he'd been driving stages out of Alturas for the past 26 years—including routes into Surprise Valley and the eight years he's been driving from Alturas to Lakeview. He lost his job to an under-bid by the Modoc Transport Company who has been hauling freight up this way for the past several years. They now will carry both freight and the mail.

Dees will be remembered by the postmasters along the route as being faithful to schedule; dependable and accommodating, to which fact his record testifies. He missed one trip in eight years and that was because the road was blocked by a blizzard. Nothing moved on the road that day. It was quite common to hear someone remark:

"You could set your clock by him—he was so regular."

He hadn't been late in the eight years of service until June 28, two days before his term expired—something happened which almost broke his heart. The fan belt broke on his Chevy panel job and knocked out the generator just as he was entering town here.

We loaned him our son's Ford to take the mail on to Lakeview. There he secured the necessary parts after a 1700 mile drive brought the mail back, had the car going almost by the time we had the mail tied and sacked and ready for him. He was just ten minutes late in Alturas that day.

In recognition of his faithful service and friendly accommodating manner, the Lakeview postoffice manager presented him with a fine fishing outfit which he prized highly and said he would sure use it.
