

# Milwaukee Braves Hand Brooklyn Double Loss

## Indians, Yankees Post Wins

It was Milwaukee's last turn at bat. There were two outs. And the Brooklyn Dodgers were leading 8-3.

It looked like the end, and Milwaukee's all-time record crowd—43,633—was ready to go home satisfied at least with an even split, the Braves having won the first game 2-0.

Except for one detail—The bases were loaded.

Joe Adcock came to bat. Reliever Jim Hughes coked his arm and prepared to finish off the side. But Adcock connected. Two men came in on his single.

Brooklyn Manager Walt Alton, taking no chances at this point, rushed Ery Palica to the mound. The crowd went wild.

Andy Patko came up. Palica tried hard, but Patko got his number and slammed out a double that brought in two more runs. It was now 8-7.

Then Johnny Logan came up. This was it. And he did—a single. In came the tying run. Logan took second on the throw to the plate.

**INCREDULOUS**

By now the incredulous crowd was ready for the kill, and catcher Charlie White's single over second, bringing Logan in, was all the Braves needed.

The score was 9-8. Milwaukee had dealt Brooklyn its first double defeat since Sept. 6, 1952.

The two losses, combined with New York's 4-0 triumph over the St. Louis Cardinals, boosted the Giants' first-place National League margin over the Dodgers to 6½ games.

Cleveland's Indians retained their half-game edge over New York in the tight American League race, defeating the Philadelphia Athletics 4-0 as the Yankees edged the Baltimore Orioles 3-1.

Chicago's third-place White Sox fell four games off the pace, losing to Washington 3-2. Detroit and Boston divided a day-night doubleheader, the Tigers winning the nightcap 4-2 after the Red Sox had taken the opener 3-1.

Cincinnati's Redlegs climbed into a three-way tie for third place with Milwaukee and Philadelphia, sweeping both ends of a twin-night bill from the Phillies 2-1 and 4-3 to spoil Terry Moore's managerial debut. Chicago's Cubs knocked off the last-place Pittsburgh Pirates twice in the afternoon 9-3 and 3-0. Hank Sauer and Ernie Banks homered in each game.

The Dodgers were limited to only three singles in the opening game by Milwaukee's Bob Buhl, who won his first game of the season after seven defeats.

Eddie Mathews slammed two homers, his 20th and 21st of the season, for the Braves. His first came in the seventh of the opener with a mate aboard to break up a scoreless duel between Buhl and Brooklyn's Bob Millkin. His second also came with a man on base to furnish Milwaukee's first two runs.

**COMBINED TALENT**

Pitcher Don Liddle and catcher Wes Westrum combined their talents to down the Cardinals. Liddle, the tiny southpaw, limited the Redbirds to five hits while Westrum walloped a home run and a single to drive in three runs.

Home runs by Andy Semick and Jimmy Greengrass enabled Art Fowler to win a pitching duel from Philadelphia's Curt Simmons in the opener of their twin bill. Gus Bell's bases-loaded single in the eighth drove in the tying and winning runs in the nightcap.

Early Wynn tamed the Athletics with four hits for his 11th victory as the Indians snapped a four-game losing streak. Al Rosen doubled in the first Cleveland run and Wynn participated in the three-run rally later with a run-scoring single off loser Alex Kellner.

The Yankees scored a run on each of two passed balls by catcher Les Moss and added another on Irv Noren's homer. Their victory string is now 10 straight.

Veteran southpaw Johnny Schmitz pitched a five-hitter and enfielder Tom Umpfield drove in all three Washington runs with a single and triple in their 3-2 victory over the White Sox.

## War Shaping Between Grid Leagues

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — Lauri Niemi, a 250-pound tackle who formerly played for the Washington Redskins, turned up as a surprise candidate for a job on the British Columbia Lions Monday night when Canada's newest professional football team opened pre-season practice.

On the same day the Green Bay Packers of the United States National Football League obtained a court order to prevent Bob Fleck, a big lineman from Syracuse University, from jumping to the Ottawa Rough Riders.

These two events pointed up the fact that Canada's pro teams, beginning the training season this week, will be preparing for war on two fronts as well as for a long football season.

They're already involved in a series of struggles with the NFL over player rights and when the season opens they'll be fighting for attention on the television screens against the U.S. college teams.

The teams of the Eastern Canada Big Four will reach the TV screens in the United States in a series of 13 Saturday afternoon broadcasts starting Aug. 28.

The NBC, shut out of U.S. football this year, is gambling that Canadian football will appeal to American viewers.

Most of the Canadian teams are scheduled to start training Friday. The B.C. Lions, a newly-organized team, began a few days early. The season opens Aug. 21 in the Western Interprovincial Football Union.

In addition to Niemi, a former Washington State College player who played with the Redskins from 1948 until last season, the Lions' most important "imports" are tackle Arnie Weinmeister from the New York Giants and end Andy Hillhouse from Texas A.M. and the Chicago Bears. The Giants lost a legal fight to keep Weinmeister.

## Defending Champ Makes Way To Net Semi-Finals

SEATTLE (AP)—Defending champion Fred Fisher stroked his way into the semi-finals of the Washington State Tennis Championships Thursday with a 6-2, 6-6, 6-2 victory over scrappy Don Fyfe of Tacoma.

Second-seeded Bill Quillian, another Seattleite, also advanced, besting Ray Albano of the Queen City, 6-2, 6-1.

Fisher and Quillian will meet the winners of Friday's quarter-finals, including Jack Lowe of Seattle against topsseeded Jacques Grigry of Los Angeles, and sixth-seeded Emery Neale of Portland against Seth Peterson of Los Angeles.

Neale teamed with Sam Lee of Portland Thursday for a 6-3, 15-13 upset men's doubles victory over Grigry and Wally Bostick of Seattle.

Peterson and Jim Demas of Sacramento eliminated Bob Seymour of Berkeley and Ross Hughes of Portland, 3-6, 6-3, 6-4.

## Navy Man Favorite In Golf Tourney

DALLAS, Tex. (AP) — Bill Scarborough, a giant chief petty officer who makes a golf club behave like a Navy rookie, and Los Angeles city champion Gene Andrews loomed as top favorites in the 29th National Public Links Tournament Friday.

Scarborough, 30-year-old Jacksonville, Fla., Naval petty officer, boomed his way into the semifinals Thursday with an assortment of terrific chip shots and a torrid putter.

Scarborough, veteran of 153 combat missions as a gunner and bombardier in World War II, easily knocked out Richard Preston of Detroit, 3 and 2, and Thomas Lambie, Phoenix, Ariz., 4 and 2, Thursday.

Andrews, who lives at Pacific Palisades, Calif., defeated E. F. Shively, Dayton, O., 3 and 2, and then eliminated John Hatch of Dallas, 6 and 8.

Andrews, eased by Dante Vicini, Ottawa, Ill., 2 - up and Rodney Funseth, Spokane, Wash., 6 and 4 in the quarter-finals.
