

Eldorado Lumberjack Nine Travels To Meet Alturas

George Slated To Pitch

Manager H. Hatfield's Eldorado Lumberjacks pack up their bags and head for Alturas tomorrow afternoon for an Oregon-California league game on the Braves home field.

This will be the third league meeting for the two clubs. Alturas won the first one and the Lumberjacks came back to win the second encounter 9-7, at Recreation Park.

In league standings, the Eldorado ball club is seated in the number two position behind league leading Bend, and Lakeview is in third place, while Alturas is in the league's cellar.

Bob Foot and Gordy Robertson are the two big sticks for the Alturas assault. Foot is a heavy hitting outfielder, and Robertson is another heavy hitter who does the pitching for the Alturas club.

Hatfield has nominated Jolo George, the ex-Oregon High School ace, to take the mound assignment against the home standing Braves tomorrow.

Doing the receiving for the Lumberjacks will be Art Westhouse, the little backstop that caught for Oregon Tech during the college season.

The Eldorado infield will be comprised of two heavy hitters at first and third as Art Raymond gets the call for the initial base position and try to hit at the hot corner. Two very fine glove men will fill out the remaining two positions as Don Smith will be at second base and Ron Owings gets the nod for the shortstop position.

Willie Dunster will be in left field and Fran Miller will be in right flanking Hatfield who will hold down the center field spot.

In case Hatfield needs help on the mound he will have Dick Lundsten or Miller handy to use against any Alturas uprisings.

In other league action, Lakeview plays host to the league leading Loggers in a Sunday afternoon ball game at Lakeview.

Tomorrow afternoon the Klamath Falls Junior Legion baseball team will meet Mt. Shasta in a non league ball game at Recreation Park starting at 1:30.

This will be the second meeting of the two league clubs this season, as Klamath posted an 8-4 win over the Californians earlier this year.

Coach John McGinnis will send any one of his three to the mound against Shasta in the afternoon game. Big Dave D'Olivio and Mo deato Jimenez the club's two leading pitchers may get the nod, or Earl Tichenor, the Cokes relief chucker, could get the job.

Tichenor pitched and batted in the last Mt. Shasta-Coke game, as

he limited the Northern California legion club to eight hits and four runs while allowing only one man to get to first on a base on balls. He also collected three hits including two doubles to help his own cause.

Bob Kelly will probably handle the catching duties, with Jerry Burke ready to do some of the receiving also, if he doesn't start in the outfield.

Jack Sunitsch, Butch Kimpton, Orin Perkins and Bob Harshbarger will get McGinnis' call for the infield positions when game time arrives. Sunitsch and Kimpton will cover the second and short stop positions around second base, while Perkins will get the third base job and Harshbarger the first base assignment.

Don Taucher, the spectacular outfielder, who adds plenty of punch to the Cokes hitting department will be in one outfield position, while Craig McCarty one of the club's power hitters will be used in the center field spot.

The right field position usually goes to David Leeling but the lefthanded hitter has been out of town and Burke has been used in right field instead by McGinnis. Others besides the starting nine who might see action are Kenny Detroit, Kenny Jensen, Jerry Branwell and Smiley Herrera, any of the four Cokes reserves are capable of filling in for McGinnis's regulars.

Game time is 1:30 at the Mills Addition ball park and a small admission charge will be made to help the ball club pay some of their expenses.

Top Golfers Meet For Amateur Title

SEATTLE — Seattle's Broadmoor Golf Course will unlock its gates Monday and let 175 top golfers start their 7-day conquest of the Western Amateur title in the 32nd showing of the event which dates back to 1899.

Playing on the exclusive, walled grounds will be defending champion Dale Morey of Indianapolis, who is rated a good chance to repeat, and others like Walker Cuppers Johnny Dawson and Jimmy McHale.

Dawson, former California amateur and open king from Palm Springs, and McHale, of Philadelphia, are rated along with Morey. Broadmoor, a 6,000-yard course has had its tees moved back new traps installed and the fairways narrowed by widening the rough to make it a bit tougher to make the 34-36-70 par.

Qualifying play will be Monday and Tuesday, cutting the field to 64. Eighteen-hole match play follows through Friday. The semifinals Saturday and finals Sunday will be over 36 holes.

Other entries expected to show well are Bruce Cudd, smooth swinging youngster from Portland, Ore., Eddie Draper, Seattle's city champion, and Harry Givan, Seattleite who holds the Broadmoor course record — a 61. Givan also is a former Walker Cup player.

Canadian Meet Led By Toronto Golfer

VANCOUVER B.C. — This is pay day in the \$15,000 Canadian Open Golf Championship and for the first time in 40 years it looks like the top prize of \$3,000 and the Seagram gold cup will be placed in Canadian hands.

Ready when the early leaders faltered, Gordie Brydson of Toronto sneaked through with a 68 Friday and took over top spot with 207 for three rounds, six under par. Puffing at a black cigar and taking the straight line from tee to green, he chipped three strokes off the Point Grey layout's par 71 in his Friday effort.

Brydson was so relaxed and confident he didn't even object when a photographer stood almost in front of him as he blasted out of a sand trap on the final hole.

He stole the thunder from another Canadian who had become the popular favorite after two red-hot rounds. The gallery, numbering 2,500 Friday, had installed Pat Fletcher of Saskatoon, Sask., as the hope of the domination after he carded 135 in two days seven under par.

Fletcher was tied at that mark with 27-year-old Bob Rosburg of San Francisco, but both of them bumped into putter trouble. When Fletcher totaled his card it read 74 and Rosburg had to settle for a 75, leaving the former in second place two strokes back of Brydson.

The day started with a horrendous 7 on the par 3 first hole and spent the rest of the day trying futilely to get those strokes back.

Just eight players in the field of 100—which has been cut to 61 for Saturday's final round—were able to shade par. One of these was Eddie Hogan of Portland, who had a 70 and moved up to a tie with Bill Welch of Kennewick, Wash., for fifth place at 212. Welch clambered around in 74.

Linked at 213 were Ruby Horvath of Windsor, Ont., who also 74'd the deceptively easy-looking course, and Doug Balus of Vancouver, an amateur who whipped around in 69. Shelley Mayfield of Chicopee, Mass., also had a 69 but is well back with a 216 total.

Only those with 229 or better will continue in action Saturday. The professionals will carve the prize money into 35 chunks, ranging downward to \$100. The victor will get an added thrill when he receives the gold cup from John Landy, famous Australian miler. Here to prepare for the British Empire Games in early August, Landy was drafted for the presentation ceremony.

Hitson Continues Point Lead

Birthday celebrations and a sponsors race will be the featured attractions of the Gem Speedway hardtop racing program Sunday night starting with time trials at 6:30.

Three of the top local drivers, Johnny Hitson, Bud Cook and George Smith all have had birthdays this week, and will be racing for an added present, the first place prize money of the A-main. Smith is the only one of three to win the main event so far this season card. The 25 lap A-main will be the lead until the double crossing the finish line in the lead a couple of times. Cook is another one of the top drivers on the track, but he also has to win a main event this season.

The sponsors race will pit the men, who pay out the money for the hardtops to run, in a special six lap event that should supply the hardtop fans with plenty of laughs and racing excitement.

Some of the business men who will be entered in this special are Bill Stepp, who will drive K-7, Roy Fernlund K-23, Erhardt Blind K-22, Dick Loomis K-33, Les Compton K-14, Ray Bramwell K-25 and Al Franceschini who will be at the wheel of K-50.

Besides this special event, the ordinary racing menu will be seen, including four ten lap heat races, a four lap trophy dash, pitting the winners of the heat races together, and the ten lap final heat, in which the top three places in the four heat races battle it out.

If the number of cars is not too large, on C-race of ten laps will be run, and the B-main of 15 laps will be next to last event on the race card. The 25 lap A-main will be the final event of the evening hardtop program, which starts with the time trials at 6:30 and the racing gets underway at 7:15.

After last week's hardtop races, Johnny Hitson still remains in the lead of the point system with a grand total of 244 counters, while the runner-up is Bob Crawley, who has the lead until the double Fourth of July program, has a total of 230 points.

The other top drivers and their points so far this season include, Rusty Philips in C-2, with 202, Benny Morrison in K-8 with 198, Matt Christian in K-84 who has 197, Al Rossi in K-42 with 172 and Wes Owens K-16 with 170. The remaining three drivers in the top ten are Jerry Barlow in C-12, Russ Newell in M-14 with 165 points apiece, and Jerry Johnson, who usually drives C-6 with 160 round out the top ten places in the point column.

Both are fast-stepping boxers who possess knockout punches and indications are it will be an even money affair at bell time. Varona is expected to scale 153 and Martinez 156.

Clem is a tough fighter that punches hard and is known to be a boring-in type of fighter, according to Lillard. Official word was expected today from the Canadian fighter's manager, who was all in favor of the fight for his boy.

Price has been working out at the Y.M.C.A. the past few weeks and last lately has been sparring with Utsal Jack Snapp, who made a name for himself in the local light picture a few years ago.

Both of the fighters are from Merrill, and Price's manager Roy Drake is the same handler that Snapp had when he was fighting here and in Portland.

Another natural is in the making for a six round special which would pit Eddie Brown against Darrell Harrington in a rematch of a bout that had the Armory boxing fans talking for sometime.

Harrington had Brown all but down in their last meeting, and while Brown was backed against the ropes hanging on for a fresh start, he landed an overhand right to Harrington's head and followed with another blow that sent Harrington to the mat for a ten count.

Brown was still nearly out on his feet as referee Wally Moss finished the count.

Two other boxers, who local fight fans will remember, will also be seeking spots on the returning fight card. Billy Sunday and Mandy Montgomery are the two fighters who are looking for bouts on the card.

Tickets are slated to go on sale Monday morning at Dick Redders Store for Men, according to Lillard.
