Fire Destroys Ft. Rock Home

FORT ROCK — Fire destroyed the ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Mattis at Fort Rock about 10:30 a.m. July 14.

Cause of the fire is unknown. When Mrs. Mattis stepped out of the house she noticed the roof on fire and called the Fort Rock store for help. Mrs. Mattis was home alone with her two boys, Max and Mike, who had just recently returned from the hospital and were convalescing from their recent illness.

The storekeeper, Andy Hergert, alerted the mill crew and the entire fire crew complete with firefighting equipment rushed to the ranch.

Help arrived too late to save the house, but corrals and adjoining buildings were saved. Help also came from the Cabin Lake ranger station and ranchers who had seen the smoke.

No personal belongings were saved except two parakeets and a few legal papers.

Value of the loss is unknown at this time as many valuable items such as guns and Indian relics, collected by Mattis, were lost.

The Fort Rock Grange and local residents are planning a benefit dance for the Mattis family this Saturday night. This dance was originally planned as a benefit for the dormitory at the Lakeview fairgrounds, which will be held at a later date.

WC Strike Vote Held

CHICAGO, ILL. — The Air Line Agents Association, an affiliate of the Air Line Pilots Association, AFL, said today that the failure of the management of West Coast Air Lines, Inc. to consider overtime premium after a 2-hour work day and to pay adequate wages forced the 150 station employees to take a strike vote.

The strike vote is in progress, said V. J. Herbert, ALAA acting president, also because West Coast Air Lines refused to submit the controversy to arbitration for the newly organized station employees.

All of the procedures of the Railway Labor Act beginning with direct negotiations in November, 1953, through mediation from March 29, to June 10, 1954, to an offer of arbitration by the mediator assigned to the case by the National Mediation Board have been carefully followed, said Herbert.

West Coast Air Lines performs important air service to the residents of Idaho, Oregon and Washington, operating 22 stations. "It is time," said Herbert, "that West Coast fall into step with other carriers handling passengers and U.S. mail in the payment of wages and hours on duty."

Boy Drowns In Sandy River

PORTLAND — The swift current of the Sandy River broke an arm-to-arm chain of YMCA boys trying to wade across and swept Donald Maust, 8, Portland, to his death Friday.

The boy was carried 150 feet downstream where he disappeared. According to sheriff's deputies the Maust youth and 26 other boys from a YMCA camp about five miles east of Gresham were wading the river on a trail trip accompanied by counselors.

The current knocked seven of the boys loose from the human chain. Six clung to Arlan Walker, 21, Portland, a counselor stationed down stream, who walked them to safety, but Donald was carried away.

Dennis Burnett and Michael Sweeney, two other counselors from Portland, made the crossing with the rest of the group.

Dragging operations to recover the body were resumed Saturday. The victim was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Herschel Maust.

Jobless Payroll Lists Reported

WASHINGTON — The Labor Department said yesterday that unemployment among workers insured for unemployment compensation dropped 96,200 during the week ended July 13 to 1,777,100, lowest level since the 1953 Christmas week.

Initial claims of jobless workers for benefits rose by 29,200 to 344,100 during the week ended July 10.

Lie Detector Use Planned

CHICAGO, ILL. — Police have decided to seek lie detector tests in their investigation of the mysterious death of mail order heir Montgomery Ward Thorne.

Sgt. Thomas Mulvey, in charge of the police investigation, said he will meet today with Coroner Walter McCarron to make up a list of persons who will be invited to submit to tests.

Thorne, heir to an estate of nearly two million dollars, was found dead in his \$75 a month room June 19, nine days after he made out a new will leaving three-fourths of his estate to his sweetheart, Maurine Ragen, 18, and her mother, Aileen.

Several inquest hearings into his death, some witnesses pictured him as a serious-minded youth with few excesses. He also has been described as a user of narcotics and liquor.

The planned lie tests presumably are designed to give a clearer picture of his personality and habits.

The bizarre aspects of the case were increased yesterday by two phantom phone calls to Jay South, attorney for the Ragens.

They came from a young man who reportedly said he was the "last person to see Monty alive."

Police can't trace the calls and think they might be a hoax.
