

Alturas Edges 'Jacks; Bend Stopped By Gems

The Eldorado Lumberjacks dropped another one-run decision yesterday afternoon at Alturas as the Braves edged by the Klamath semi-pros 11-10.

Despite five home runs by Eldorado hitters, the Alturas were able to pull the close Oregon-California League game out of the hat with two big innings, the second and sixth.

Eldorado led going into the bottom of the second 2-0, but a three-run outburst by Alturas on three walks, two singles and a pair of errors gave them a 3-2 lead.

Both teams countered again Alturas in the fourth, Eldorado in the fifth. Trailing by a 5-4 score in the first of the sixth the Lumberjacks countered twice on Dick Lundsten's home run over the left field fence to take a temporary lead.

In the Alturas half of the sixth, five hits, all singles, and another pair of walks gave the Braves a five-run inning and a 10-6 lead. The final Alturas run came in the seventh frame on a walk, passed ball and a stolen base.

Eldorado tallied twice in the last inning but couldn't tie the ball game up. Home runs by Art Raymond and Fran Miller completed the Lumberjack scoring for the league game.

Besides Lundsten's, Miller's and Raymond's home runs, Manager H Hatfield and Ron Owings also collected out of the park blows. Hatfield got his in the seventh inning and Owings in the eighth.

Miller led the Lumberjacks at the plate with a three for four day. Whit and Hatfield all collected two hits apiece.

Alturas' Pete Stanford led the Braves stickmen with three safeties in five times at bat, while four other Alturas hitters collected two safeties.

Art Parul, Eric Arwood, Earl Chappell and Danny Dorris all hit safely in two appearances. One of Arwood's blows was a home run.

In the other league game at Lakeview, the Gems edged the league leading Bend Loggers 5-4 in eleven innings to give the Loggers their first league loss of the season.

Bobby Long paced the Gems with a fine five hit pitching job, while striking out 13 Bend hitters over the full 11 innings.

The game, which was protested from the third inning on by Bend, was spotlighted with a third inning home run by Wes Dollarhide that sparked a four run inning for Lakeview.

Tut Bartzen Wraps Up Net Tourney

CHICAGO (AP) — In scoring his first major tennis victory, southpaw Bernard (Tut) Bartzen proved his 135 pounds are not to be taken lightly hereafter by the game's big guns.

Bartzen, San Angelo, Tex., sporting goods salesman, wrapped up the National Clay Court crown yesterday with a 6-2 4-6, 6-9, 6-2 victory over the nation's premier amateur, Tony Trabert of Cincinnati.

Prior to that championship match at the suburban River Forest Tennis Club, Bartzen had whipped the country's second-ranked player, Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, 7-5, 6-4 6-2, in a semifinal.

The 26-year-old Bartzen knocked off Seixas, then Trabert with a dogged retrieving game in which he capitalized fully on every mistake the two stars made.

Against Seixas, the 5-foot-8 Texan loped tirelessly around the baselines and back court, saving scores of blasts off the powerful Philadelphia's racket. Eventually Seixas began to press too hard and made a number of conspicuous errors.

Squaring off against the formidable Trabert, Bartzen gave immediate indication that he was by no means intimidated, breaking the Cincinnati star's first service and taking the first set easily.

Trabert turned on all his power in the second set, bulging through to victory on his fast serve and tremendous net game.

But that was Tony's last real showing against the rugged little Bartzen, who began picking up the preponderance of points again as Trabert's big game wilted under the pressure of the 94-degree heat and Bartzen's persistent returns.

Hutchinson Sees Flag For Yankees

NEW YORK (AP)—Manager Freddie Hutchinson of the Detroit Tigers and Schoolboy Rowe, his first lieutenant, agreed today that the New York Yankees will win their sixth straight pennant but they differ as to the degree.

Hutchinson thinks the Yankees will win only after a hard-fought battle with Cleveland and Rose believes the defending champions will win in a breeze.

Hutchinson commented on the Yankees' prospects yesterday after the Tigers had split a doubleheader with them, losing 6-0, then winning 6-4.

"I'm not sure they have the better team, but they have a psychological edge over Cleveland," he said. "After all, they've been in three straight dogfights with the Indians and they've come out on top every time."

Rowe, former Tiger pitching great who returned to the club in the capacity of a pitching and first base coach this year, didn't mince any words.

"I can't see anybody but the Yankees. There's nobody around that can beat 'em. They're making their move now and once they grab the lead from Cleveland, nobody is going to take it away from them. Certainly not the Indians. They'll fold like an accordion. They always do."
