Portland Helps Stars Fatten Lead

Hollywood's re-ascending Stars, with some help from Portland, took a firm grip on first place in the Pacific Coast League standings Sunday, even though their manager and second baseman were ousted in the nightcap with Oakland.

Hollywood is four games in front after taking both ends of the twin bill from the A's 6-0 and 5-1. The battle occurred in the second inning of the second game when Star second baseman Monte Basgall hit to left field. One umpire called the ball fair but another said it was foul. Basgall sat on the bench while the argument with umpire Don Flecke. Star manager Bobby Bragan joined the discussion. Flecke ordered him and Basgall from the game.

Portland observed the return of Luke Easter to the league by whipping him and second place San Diego 5-3 in a doubleheader opener. But the big Negro's second game homer produced two runs and helped win the nightcap 3-0. Cliff Fanning blanked the Beavers on three hits.

Portland's Walt Juhnich hit the only homer of the opener—with one on. First baseman Easter connected for four hits, including a homer and a double in seven times up during the afternoon.

Seattle took over undisputed fifth place in the standings by dropping Sacramento twice in succession—1-0 in 11 innings and 13-3. The Solons are now two games back in sixth.

In the opener, Clarence Maden's 8th homer of the year cracked an 11-inning scoreless pitching duel between Orestes Chet Johnson and Seattle's Bob Hall. It was enough to win the game. Hall and Johnson, tossing superb ball, both went the distance.

In the finale, Rainier Al Widmar scattered eight hits and contributed heavily to his own mound win with a base-clearing double in the first inning when the Suds, incidentally, got seven runs.

Los Angeles, with three homers, slipped to a 5-2 win over third place San Francisco.

Australia Lays Claim To Outstanding Stars

NEW YORK (AP)—There is no reason why the Australians should not be permitted to take a few bows for the recent successes of their young athletes in international competition.

Rulers of world tennis for the past three years, they now are making rapid strides toward a similar domination in golf. They have John Landy, holder of the mile record of 3:58, and they are among the world's mightiest swimmers. They have been the world's cricket champions for so long that England is thoroughly sick of them.

Two of the most coveted golfing crowns fell in recent months to a pair of sharpshooters. Avonlea, whose names scarcely were known in this country. First, Douglas Bachli, a small-size tavern owner from Rosebud, Victoria, won the British amateur title by defeating his own Bill Campbell in the final, and then Peter Thomson, a 22-year-old pro from Melbourne, who had done well on the American winter circuit, mopped up the British Open to complete a great double.

All of which adds up to an amazing record for a nation which at the most recent head count numbered only about 7½ million persons, not counting aborigines. As

one who has made several trips to the country, we are asked with increasing frequency if there is any ready explanation for the out-of-all-proportion successes of the Aussies.

The answer is, well, yes. They are a big, healthy people, and they are crazier about more different forms of sport than the inhabitants of any other plot on the globe, including this one. You put the combination together and you are going to come up with an awful lot of good athletes.

Pride has something to do with it. The Australians feel that they are a little nation, and remote, and it affords them tremendous pleasure to knock over the big boys. As a painful for instance, they get a bigger wallop out of pinning our ears back in Davis Cup Tennis than we would out of beating them—as if we ever do.

Edmonton, Salem Post Double Wins

Salem and Edmonton posted Western International Baseball League victories Sunday, while Wenatchee and Lewiston split a doubleheader.

Salem tripped Tri-City 7-5 at Kennewick and Edmonton wound up a seven-game home stand with a 5-4 win over Yakima. Wenatchee stretched a win streak to three games by shading Lewiston 2-3 in the opener at Wenatchee, but the Broncos took the nightcap 6-5.

The split left Lewiston tied percentage-wise atop the standings with the Victoria Ties who were idle Sunday along with the Vancouver Caplans.

Salem won over Tri-City with a two-run rally in the top of the ninth after an uphill battle from the opening frame.

Tri-City scored all its runs in the first inning on four singles, a double and a walk off Bill Franks and reliever Ernie Domenichelli.

Salem hobbled away at the lead, helped along by Tri-City errors, and knotted the score in the fourth. Doubles by Mel Krause and Gene Tansell and a single by Connie Perez sent in the winning runs in the ninth.

At Edmonton, leadoff man a Whitey Thompson hit a home run in the first inning for what proved to be the margin of victory. The Eskimos scored four more runs in the fourth. Yakima scoring was on two-run homers by Gus Charoulas in the fifth and the seventh. The win gave Edmonton the series 5-2.

Wenatchee's Charlie Beaman turned in the day's best pitching job, a three-hitter in the seven-inning opener with Lewiston. The Broncos managed only one hit until the seventh. Eddie Stanky, scrappy manager of the St. Louis Cards, boils on the hot seat today after a fist fight with Terry Moore, the man he fired as coach, and a forfeit to the Phillies for delaying tactics.

Stanky and Moore, new manager of Philadelphia, tangled in the

midst of one of St. Louis' worst ball field riots in years yesterday to climax a flaming two-year-old feud.

After Moore was fired in 1952, he departed from his normal mild ways to blast Stanky. "When he loses a ball game he acts more like a 9-year-old boy than a manager," he said. "The job is too big for him. Stanky is temperamentally unsuited for the job of manager."

Fireworks were expected when Moore, named manager Thursday, met Stanky's Cards for the first time. It happened yesterday at Busch Stadium and they're still picking up the pieces. It was the first forfeit since 1949.

Coming from behind, three times the Phils pulled out the first game 11-10 in 10 innings on a double by Smokey Burgess and a single by Bobby Morgan. The game had been delayed 1 hour and 18 minutes by rain in the seventh.

The second game didn't start until after 6 p.m., so lights could not be turned on under National League rules. With darkness approaching in the fifth and the Phils leading 6-1 with one man on base and two out, Stanky had brought in two new pitchers and had waved for a third when umpire Babe Pinelli walked to the field telephone and notified the press box that the game was forfeited to Philadelphia 9-0. No individual records go into the book because the legal five innings weren't completed.

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
