Passage Of Farm Bill Delayed

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Sen. Aiken (R-Vt.) said Thursday Senate Democratic leaders have forced a delay in action on the general farm bill until next Wednesday.

Sen. Aiken, who is chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, said the Democratic leaders had served notice they would not agree to action on the bill until after the July 27 primary election.

Sen. Aiken called reporters to his office and handed them a statement telling of the Democratic action.

Sen. Aiken said he decided to disclose the move because "I've got fed up with being blamed for delay on this farm bill."

Sen. Aiken said earlier that the farm bill would be next in line on the Senate calendar.
