

Lava Beds Tours Held By Rangers

TULELAKE — Interest is increasing in the naturalist programs at the Lava Beds National Monument according to Ray Knox, acting superintendent. More than 20 visitors took the trip to Fern Cave, July 18 and some 60 persons heard

the lecture in Mushpot Cave, given by P. Quentin Tomich, ranger-naturalist. Keith Murray, monument historian, new arrival on the staff, has been a member of the advisory board of Washington State Parks and is a professor at Western State Teacher's College, Bellingham.

A collection of Indian artifacts and other historical material has been loaned to the museum at the monument headquarters by Steve Rudisell, first local resident to an-

light saving time. The tour will end at noon. Clothing suitable for hiking should be worn and lunches should be taken. The same day and the following Sunday, colored slides of the Lava Beds will be shown in Mushpot Cave, 3-5 p.m. The show lasts about 30 minutes.

August 1, visitors to the monument will be taken on a trip to Sunken Valley, Mammoth Crater and Heppie Caves. Those going are to meet at the Indian Wells Ranger Station 9:30 a.m. daylight time. This tour will last until 1 p.m.

Children's tours are scheduled for Wednesday, July 28 and August 4, on the subjects of birds wild flowers, trees and animal identification in addition to a tour of the museum. Lunch should be taken. Tours start at 10 a.m. at the Indian Well Ranger Station, end at the campground.

All tours are conducted by rangers of the Lava Beds staff.

New Poultry Term Proposed

The term "strain" in poultry will have a stricter meaning as a result of a new definition proposed for the National and Oregon Poultry and Turkey Improvement plans. It will mean stock bearing a given name produced by a breeder through at least five generations of closed flock breeding, according to the State Department of Agriculture.

That means a producer has to keep all his birds under his own control and can't add any birds from elsewhere. When he has done this, he can advertise a certain strain of chickens or turkeys.

This is one of several new provisions being written into the plans, which are voluntary associations of breeders working under national and state official agencies to improve breeding stock. The changes were adopted at the June National Plans Conference, and now await ratification of the federal department of agriculture.

SP Announces New Controls

Push-button railroading is expanding this summer on the Southern Pacific's lines from Eugene to Crescent Lake.

L. P. Hopkins, superintendent of the railroad's Portland Division, said today centralized traffic control installations are being hooked up to a central control panel at Eugene at the rate of about one a week.

Seven S.P. signal crews, he added, have completed the intricate installations along approximately 21 miles of line so far, linking Eugene with Springfield and Mohawk Junctions, Natron, Douren and Dexter.

The railroad plans to complete the 95 mile circuit to Crescent Lake by mid-November, which will bring to 273 the total miles of line over the Shasta Route under centralized traffic control.

CTC, Hopkins explained, is a complex electronic system by which a dispatcher can better control the movement of trains, so allowing heavier-than-normal traffic loads to be handled more efficiently over a single track.

The project, part of a large scale Southern Pacific modernization program, is costing the railroad about \$3,800,000.
