### Chukars To Be Released

Liberation of this year's crop of chukar partridge from the Hermiton game farm began on July 15. An initial load of 700 birds approximately 8 weeks old were taken from the farm for release at sites selected in Lake county. Roy Dickinson, game farm superintendent, reported that this was the first liberation of birds raised this year. Releases earlier in the spring consisted of the brood stock of 2,368 adult chukars that had been held for egg production. Approximately 3,000 of these young birds will be released during July. Later releases during August and September will consist of from 6 to 8 thousand young birds from 8 to 12 weeks of age. Since all of the chukars for eastern Oregon are raised at the Hermiton game farm, it is necessary to make an early morning start to distant points so that the birds will be in transit for as short a time as possible and will not be held overnight in cramped quarters. Last year a shipping loss of only nine birds was experienced in moving 10,984 birds throughout the eastern part of Oregon. This will be the third consecutive year that approximately 10 thousand chukars have been released in eastern Oregon.

## DAR Preserves Historic Pioneer Cabin At Champoeg

Attention is being drawn by the Daughters of the American Revolution to the importance of the efforts of the DAR to preserve for coming generations the history of those who came as pioneers to the state of Oregon. Mrs. Guy Barton, regent of Eulalona Chapter DAR, Klamath Falls received the following information on the work that is being done on one of the most historic spots in the state, the old pioneer cabin at Champoeg, near Salem. "It took the inventive mind of one of the former first ladies of Oregon, Mrs. Isaac Lee Patterson, wife of Governor Patterson, to present the original idea of reproducing an old Pioneer Cabin at Champoeg, the birthplace of Oregon's first organized government. She outlined the project at a State Conference at Medford in 1929, and with all in accord, the work began at once. A beautiful historic site on the bank of the Willamette River at Champoeg was given by the State and on the spot where the old Apple Cabin stood in fur trading days, the DAR Pioneer Mothers Memorial Cabin was built and completed in 1931. It is a copy of an early pioneer home, spacious in design, with rake shake roof and large stone fireplace. Many valuable furnishings were secured, and the museum was cared for and kept open by volunteer workers from the various chapters. As the years passed an increasing need was felt for a permanent caretaker to protect the property and encourage further gifts. This resulted in the completion of a curator's cottage this year, and the museum is now open to the public six days a week. The new State DAR Museum chairman, Mrs. Howard C. Moore of Eugene, Oregon, has planned her work and is anticipating an interesting and active year. Mrs. Moore is a member of the Lewis and Clark Chapter in Eugene, an author, and her chief interest is early history in the Oregon country. She was born and raised in Eugene, of pioneer parents; the Mitchell Wilkins on her father's side came to Oregon in 1847, and the Nelson Gottas on her mother's side in 1853. She is a graduate of the University of Oregon, and married Howard C. Moore, a surgeon in the Medical Corps of the United States Army, now a retired colonel after thirty-two years of service. The story of Eugene, a history of her home town, was written by

Mrs. Moore and her sisters Mrs. Nina McCormack, the State DAR insignia chairman, and Mrs. Gladys McCready. Her first novel, "The Wheel and the Hearth," a story of the Oregon Trail told from a woman's angle, was published last year, and Mrs. Moore is very proud to have received the Silver Spur Award of Western Writers of America as the best western historical novel of 1953. The Oregon State Society DAR are anxious to assist Mrs. Moore in every way in creating interest in the Champoeg museum. Many new gifts have been recently added to the collection, including some very valuable Indian material. The beautiful white buckskin gown of Princess Lotte, daughter of the last Chief Jackson of the Coos Indian tribe, and her ceremonial costume dating back to 1830, are on display at the museum. ### US Technicians Leave Indochina

TOKYO (AP) — U. S. Air Force technicians sent to Indochina to help service planes used by French Union forces are out of Indochina and back at their home bases, the Air Force said Thursday night. The first group of technicians was flown to Indochina last February to maintain U.S.-built B26 bombers and C47 cargo planes. The only U.S. airmen still in Indochina are crews and support personnel for giant C119 Flying Boxcars of the Far East Air Forces Cargo Command, the Air Force said.
