Allen Bousman Looking For Second A-Main Win

Allen Bousman will be out to be the second driver to win two main events this Sunday evening at the Gem Speedway hardtop races, and the racing fans will be out to win the special contest that will be held by the track management.

Bousman won last week's surprising main event, by taking an early lead in the 25 lap race and held on for the first A-main win this season for the driver of K-25.

As Bousman was holding the lead going into the final few laps, Benny Morrison in K-8 was making a strong bid to take away the lead, but despite a last minute surge, Bousman crossed the finish line out in front.

The special on tomorrow night's hardtop program will be a watermelon eating contest for the spectators. A prize has been donated by the track management for the person who can eat the most melon in a designated amount of time.

Any person over 18 years of age is eligible to enter the contest. If anyone is interested in joining in the fun of tomorrow night's hardtop program, they can sign up with Sam Neale tomorrow evening at the Speedway.

As Bousman was coping the A-main honors, Johnny Hiltson was enlarging his point lead over Bob Crawley who is being pushed by Benny Morrison for the runner-up spot.

Hiltson's K-7 has a 279 point total for the leadership while Crawley and Morrison now have 235 and 230 respectively.

The other top 10 drivers include Matt Christian with 224, Rusty Phillips 202, Al Frost with 200, Queens 192, Jerry Barlow 191, Jerry Johnson 159 and Neil Mayfield has moved into the top ten with a 146 point margin.

Tomorrow night's program will consist of the usual four heat races of ten laps apiece, the trophy dash of four laps and a ten lap final heat race. The C-race or consolation event will be ten laps and the semi-main event will go for a 15 lap distance, while the A-main is slated for 25 turns around the quarter mile speedway track. Time trials will get underway at 6:30 and after all of the drivers have time in for the races, the first of four heat races will get started.

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Seals Trip Stars In Extra Innings

San Francisco took a big game from Hollywood Friday night. It was the first one the Seals had salvaged from the series, but the 3-2 victory after 15 torrid innings reduced the Stars' lead over second place San Diego in the Pacific Coast League standing to 4 1/2 games.

Mayfield, Oliver Lead PGA

ST. PAUL, Minn. (P)—There's more to match play golf than mere mathematics, but the figures might give you the winner of the 36th PGA Championship.

With only 16 players left after the two 18-hole "sudden death" rounds were passed with a minimum of unforeseen casualties, there was time today to check up on the "hot" players.

The three who have played the bare 6,652-yard Keller Public course the best for three days include two of the best-natured guys in the pro golf business — Ed "Porky" Oliver of Lemont, Ill., and Argentina's Roberto de Vicenzo — and the usually-serious Shelly Mayfield, from Texas by way of Chicopee, Mass.

Here's how they stand against Keller's vulnerable par of 36-35-71 for two days of qualifying and two rounds of 18-hole match play: Mayfield has shot 65 competitive holes here 15 strokes under par.

Oliver is 11 under par for 69 holes. De Vicenzo is nine under par for 65 holes.

To these might be added Dutch Harrison of St. Louis, who didn't sparkle in the qualifying round but beat two tough opponents, Jackie Burke and Johnny Palmer yesterday.

Almost among the survivors of those first two rounds are three-time champion Sam Snead, defending champion Wally Burkemo; Johnny Revolta, the PGA champion back in 1935; and former open champion Cary Middlecott.

Among the missing are open champion Ed Furgol, victim of the only real upset of the first day; ex-champion Jimmy Turnesa and three players who have been runners-up in this tournament, Palmer, Mike Turnesa and Henry Williams.

Furgol was the second round victim of Jim Browning from Weston, Mass.

The Baltimore event, which was to have been held next week with many of the nation's top stars competing, was wiped out abruptly the other day, without any official reason being given. From authoritative sources, however, it was learned that several of the big names were demanding more expensive money than the traffic would bear, one of them having estimated that it would cost him \$400 just to live in Baltimore that week.

Whatever the cause, there goes another to join the list of long-famous tennis fixtures that have given up the struggle in recent years — Seabright, Southampton, and Spring Lake among others. There will be no tournament for the boys to play in next week, and at last report they were scrambling about trying to line up some exhibitions to provide them with meal money until they are more gainfully employed.

The players finally are becoming frightened at what they have done to a good thing, Sidney Wood Jr., president of the Tennis Players League, has called a special meeting of that body July 30 for the purpose of seeking to effect "drastic corrective measures" against the "unwarranted demands" of the chief culprits.

It's about time, but from long experience with tennis players who are moved to doubt that anything can come of the league's belated effort. The sham of amateur tennis has existed too long, with the knowledge and acquiescence of the game's officials, for any drastic reforms to be made now.

The top stars, accustomed to living well on their special talents, are not going to agree to any proposal that they reduce their take-home pay to conform with that of their rank-and-file brothers in sport, who get knocked out in the first and second rounds. They know all too well that the leading lady draws a fatter pay envelope than the members of the chorus line.

Grigry and Ray Albano of Seattle will meet Peterson and Demas in the men's doubles final and Peterson-Ellenberger are matched with Demas - Kifer in the mixed doubles.

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TIME OUT

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Tomorrow afternoon the Eldorado Lumberjacks meet the Alturas Tigers in an Oregon California League ball game on the Recreation Park diamond starting at 1:00. This meeting of the two teams

will be more of a battle for the league's cellar since both teams are virtually out of the running for the circuit's championship flag.

In the past three meetings, Alturas has taken two victories, leaving the Lumberjacks with one. Last week the Tigers edged the Eldorado club by a close 11-10 score at Alturas.

Manager Hi Hatfield will be experimenting again this weekend, trying to find the right combination to overcome the one run deficit that has been the Lumberjacks' downfall in the last four games.

Art Westhouse, the Oregon Tech baseball, will probably be in the catcher's position, while either Jo George or Fran Miller will get the opening call for the pitching duties against the Tigers.

The major change will be in the infield where Hatfield will have Irv Whit at first base instead of third as he has usually played, and Dick Lundsten will move from the outfield into the second base slot.

Don Sumitsch, who has been second will move to third, and Ron Owings will complete the key-stone combination with Lundsten at shortstop.

Hatfield will take over center field, while Willie Dunster will hold down the left field position and Art Raymond the club's heavy hitter will probably open in right field. Miller, Kenny Young or George could also see action in the Lumberjack's outfield.

Alturas will probably counter with their playing manager Bob Foote either on the mound or in the outfield and Gordy Robertson is another Tiger who might possibly start against the Lumberjacks in the pitching position.

In other league action, Bend, the league leaders, will play host to the Lakeview Gems, who last week handed the Loggers their first defeat in league play this year behind the pitching of Bobby Long.

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
